**Bible Readings for today: Psalm 65 v.9-13 & Matthew 13 v.1-9 & 18-23** if you do not have a Bible to hand, here Jesus tells one of his most famous stories – the parable of the Sower, and later interprets it for the disciples.

**Reflection**: I love stories! Words are my passion, as an English Literature graduate, I love to lose myself in a good story. That's also why I love going to the theatre, because, at its best, it is all about good story-telling and bringing words and characters to life. Today's reading from Matthew is perhaps Jesus' most famous parable and Jesus was a wonderful storyteller, using everyday incidents and objects to tell his listeners something about the nature of God's kingdom and love. With a wonderful picture of the traditional method of

sowing seed; casting it out from the bag and seeing where it lands; Jesus talks of the different ways in which people receive the word of God in their lives. I believe there is great encouragement to us all in this story for these times. Each of us is capable of spreading the Word in our words, actions and prayers. I often say that we never really know what seeds we have sown in the hearts of others. So, I invite you now to take your slip of paper, write a message about God's love and grace on it, however brief, roll the paper into a tight tube and cast it away from you onto the ground. As you do that ask God to inspire you in ways in which you can share the Gospel message in the coming week. Amen (reflection idea from Roots)

**Prayers of Intercession:** O God of healing love, we pray for all who are in hospital, hospice or ill at home in these anxious days, continuing to hold before you those who are suffering with Covid 19. We remember in our prayers all NHS staff whatever their role. We pray for our friends and families who we miss so dearly and for our church family with whom we join in worship and prayer. Strengthen us all, Lord, to be a blessing to others because of your love in our hearts. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
