Reflection

Advent, for many, means a 25 day calendar filled with chocolates. It's a time of busyness as we rush around preparing for Christmas; shopping for food and gifts, for decorations and tinsel, and huge family gatherings. This year will be different. Gatherings will be smaller, or even, not taking place this Christmas.

But perhaps that won't be a bad thing. Instead of been caught up in the frenetic, hectic streets of Bethlehem, perhaps this year, we can truly enter the quiet and calm of a dark stable, to sit with a young couple and their baby.

Can we reflect more deeply on the true meaning of that first Christmas?

And in the same way, can Advent be more meaningful this year, as we reflect quietly at home?

Advent is a time for looking ahead, to watch for signs of Christ's return. But the Gospel reading today, puts us in a dark place as our starting point. That actually seems quite appropriate this year. We have been living in dark times, you may have even considered “Is this the End Times we are living through?”

But Jesus reminds, by the imagery of the fig tree, that in the midst of the darkness of winter, we should look for signs of the brightness of summer. They do still appear, unexpectedly, bringing hope for the future. I don't have figs in my garden, but there are blackcurrant bushes. The branches now have no leaves, but on each tip is a bud – the sign of a bumper harvest of fruit for next summer – and delicious jam and pies.

That involves waiting. And sometimes we have to be patient and wait to see the signs of hope. When we are feeling low and vulnerable, as many are at the moment, when we want to hear that things are getting back to normal, the glimmers of hope can pass us by. We hear the good news that vaccines are being developed, but it still may be some time before we receive them, and we still must comply with the restrictions to get through this dark winter, which is probably going to feel rather long.

Darkness is still surrounding us, but Jesus urges us not to give up hope; be alert and watchful, and to look for the signs of his presence in our lives today.

Consider...

When did you get an unexpected call from a friend to cheer you up?

When did something you were dreading, turn out to be better than expected?

How many of your prayers been answered?

When we are alert and watchful, we do see the glimmers of light in the darkness, and

can even feel that touch of love reaching out to us.

God's love is all around us, we only have to open our eyes and see.

As Jesus said "What I say to you, I say to everyone: 'Watch!'"
