‘Nothing Without Love’

1 Corinthians 13 – The Gift of Love

13 If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal.² And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing.³ If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast,^[a] but do not have love, I gain nothing.

⁴ Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant ⁵ or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; ⁶ it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. ⁷ It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

⁸ Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. ⁹ For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; ¹⁰ but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. ¹¹ When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. ¹² For now we see in a mirror, dimly,^[b] but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. ¹³ And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

Reflection: NOTHING WITHOUT LOVE

If I do not have love, I am nothing and if I do not have love, I gain nothing. Paul's statement here in his first letter to the Corinthians is a bold one and yet when I consider what it means, I am inclined to agree.

Over the last year the phrase 'Nothing without love' as kept coming to mind. I believe relates both to Paul's words, and how God calls us to live.

I've heard it said that 'there has to be more than love', that 'it isn't just about love.' and whilst I appreciate when this has been said, reference might have been being made to Salvation in Christ and Christian living which is fruitful in its discipleship, through taking up the way of the cross in following Jesus. There is no getting away from the fact that without love all this wouldn't be possible. Without love, Christian living becomes empty, it loses its way becoming a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal and no one wants to become one of those.

Let's remember, we love because God first loved us. Don't forget, that God so loved the world that he sent his only Son.

Consider how throughout the Gospels, we read how Jesus had compassion, and compassion comes from a place of love.

Think of Jesus giving himself to be a Sacrifice for all people, love displayed upon the cross for you and for me. If you are still not convinced, let's look to what Jesus said about love.

In verse nine, Jesus speaks of an overflowing of love which comes from the Father. And continues to make clear that the key to remaining in God's love is keep the commandments that Christ Jesus gives. In this pursuit of a life of love we know the joy that comes from God alone. Joy which is experienced in our depth of our inner being and which is our strength from God.

So, what are Jesus' commandments? Put simply, to Love each other as Jesus, as God has loved you. God is love and Jesus talks about what it

means to know His love, love which is the greatest of all love. And what is the greatest love?

Greater love has no one than that which Jesus gives in laying down His life for his friends. And Jesus calls us to be his friends and to know the reality of the greatest love in our lives.

What difference does this make to our relationship with God? Being called friend by Jesus, knowing salvation because of His redeeming love, we are transformed by the love of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It is out of our transforming loving relationship with God that we bear fruit, fruit which is a Christlike character evident to others. Again, it is love which is at the heart of all this as we come full circle to Jesus' commandments to Love God with our all and to love each other.

With all this in mind, I am going to suggest that we do 'nothing without love', speak 'nothing without love', that Christian living is 'nothing without love.'

Love features in so many songs over the years, here are a few and several I have personally never heard of before, but with the wonders of google discovered loads. Here's what I found.

It must have been love *by Roxette 1986*; I believe in a thing called love *by The Darkness 2002*; Best of My Love *by The Emotions 1977*;

Endless Love *by Lionel Richie 2014*; Will you love me tomorrow *by The Shirelies 1960*; This is love *by will.i.am 2013*;

To know him is to love him *by The Teddy Bears, 1959*; All you need is love *by The Beatles*; I will always love you *by Whitney Houston*; I just called to say I love you *by Stevie Wonder*;

Message of Love *by The Pretenders*; Best of My Love *by Eagles*; Chapel of Love *by The Dixie Cups* Big Love *by Fleetwood Mac*;

I wonder which of the songs you know, and which songs have come to your mind that I've not included. The use of word love in the English language is fully dependant upon its context for

understand it's meaning. I love chocolate and I love my friend mean hugely different things, but this is less of the case with New Testament Greek, with several words for love. The most familiar are the famous four: Eros – Romantic love; Storge – Family love / Parent; Philia – Brotherly love / Friendship and Agape – Is what we tend to use for divine Godly love.

All this, the songs and varying depths of expression speaks to me about how we can see God's fingerprint within the world we live.

And let's not forget the song 'Love changes everything' by Andrew Lloyd Webber. With the lyrics 'How you live and how you die'. How does the God's love change how you live? I'd suggest that love especially changes everything when that love is God's.

So how do we love God with our all and love each other. Well, the ways are many.

One of the ways is through how we care pastorally for others. I want to touch on this briefly, yet I want to be clear on how valuable the ministry of our pastoral visitors is to the life of the church and wider community in which we love and serve the Lord.

You might have heard it said that someone might have had several pastoral visits for different members of the church, yet if the Ordained Minister hasn't visited, it is said that the church hasn't visited.

This is of course not true. But it is devaluing and disempowering towards those who have call upon their life to exercise a ministry of pastoral care.

Over the last 18 months I have been so encouraged by the great number of people who have stepped up the pace of their ministry, providing pastoral care to an even greater number of people and doing it in new and creative ways. I want to thank each person who has been making phone calls, who has been printing and circulating newsletters and worship at home materials and those who have been

making pastoral visits and shopping to help and show love and care.

I thank you and celebrate your ministry which is so valued and such an important part of the life of the church.

In a couple of weeks, we see the start of the new Methodist Church year and whilst we don't know what the new year will bring, we know who we can trust and who holds our future.

I hope and pray that we will see a year filled with acts of love, doing 'nothing without love'; a year when we are compelled to speak 'nothing without love', that we are motivated in our Christian living by being in the love of God.

So 'nothing without love,' wouldn't it amazing to see the greatest commandments come to life and for lives to be transformed; for the love of God to rule our hearts, minds, strength and to know the love of God dwell deeply within our souls.

May we, therefore, remember without the love of God we are nothing, nothing without love.
