## Ripon And Lower Dales Circuit Newsletter

**Welcome** to the first issue Herald, the circuit newsletter. It may seem strange to be launching this during a pandemic. However, strange things for strange times. Its purpose is to proclaim the Gospel and the love of God discovered in daily lives and communities across the Ripon and Lower Dales Circuit.

### **What is a Circuit? A potted overview of how we come together in The Methodist Church.**

In 'The Methodist Church of Great Britain we hold that 'The Circuit is the primary unit in which Local Churches express and experience their interconnexion in the Body of Christ, for purposes of mission, mutual encouragement and help. To put it another way, we are one in the Body of Christ, joining in with God in His mission and being there for one another.

The Ripon and Lower Dales Circuit is made up of 15 Local Churches. So Local Churches make a Circuit, and Circuits make a District. We are part of the Yorkshire North and East District which is cared for and led by Revd. Leslie Newton, the Chair of the District. We can find a great wealth of love and support from across the District. There is an abundance of opportunities to access training days; retreats; support and help. We have experienced the District gathering in an amazing way through Flourish, the District weekend which met in Scarborough last year. Presently many are joining in the District with 'Great 50 Days' focusing on three themes, Love; Pray; Give.

All together Local Churches, Circuits, Districts make up The Methodist Church in Great Britain, which is governed by The Conference. The Conference meets annually and in-between authorises Methodist Council to act on behalf of the Conference. Methodist Council keeps in constant review the life of the Methodist Church providing spiritual leadership to the Church as one of its many roles.

Each year a new President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference are appointed. These Presidential roles are equal, contrary to the titles. Both preside at the Conference and act as the representative embodiment of its authority, offering oversight and leadership of the Church in responding to God's Spirit and developing prophetic vision. This year we have seen Rev Barbara Glasson and Clive Marsh fulfil these roles with the Presidential theme of asking 'So What's the Story?'. You can access a wealth of information, transcripts of speeches and other useful links via the Methodist Conference website and The Methodist Church Website. I hope this potted overview has given you a greater sense of how we are all connexion together and the gifts we give to the wider Church.

Listening to the news on the radio on Sunday morning I heard that 1 in 4 adults have watched or listened to a religious service since the Coronavirus began and 20% have started praying. Some of these say they have never been to church. We need to identify this spiritual need in our communities, amid uncertainty and despair, and offer our Good News to others.



### **Pause for thought – Escapism by Rev Gareth Baron**

Over the past weeks whilst the world is in lockdown and weathering the storm of CORVID-19, it has been particularly interesting to see those means usually used for Escapism increase in use by many for the opposite. Suddenly the television and the internet have come into their own with connecting people. I fully grasp the value in escapism, everyone needs downtime to recharge batteries and regain perspective on life. For me, the analogy of being stood to close to a map comes to mind. You sometimes must take a step back to be able to see the full picture and navigate. Sometimes we need to catch our breath to continue and it is hardly surprising that when we feel overwhelmed by things we seek to escape.

In the book of Romans chapter eight we are assured that nothing will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord. [Romans 8:39] For me, even when I feel the need for escapism, it is never from the love of God. On the contrary, often I feel the need to escape into the loving presence of God.

Many will have turned to God in this time and I pray that the whole world would seek to find God their refuge and strength. The truth is that escapism is only ever a temporary distraction from reality. I would suggest 'Is God our reality?' is the question we need to ask ourselves. I and others have used the phrase 'God is with us' frequently since this pandemic began. I still witness to that truth but want to frame it differently. God is with all people; God is with you. Yes, it does not fit on the poster quite as well and does say the same thing. Yet, I want to encourage us all to hear and know this personally, what is more, I encourage you to escape into in the sanctuary of God.
