Pause for thought – images and imagination

Being dyslexic and living in a world of words brings daily challenges. Communication can often feel frustrating when your internal processing feels prohibited by constructed language of words. Yet, communication is much more than words, for words themselves represent something else be it action or emotion and often change meaning depending on the tone of how they are spoken.

Sometimes in worship I like to invite imagination which introduces another tool of communication, the mind, and images. I recognise that for some, this can feel like how I feel with words. And using imagination also brings with it as many variations as there are people imagining. However, I believe when we begin to imagine, we begin to look outward and seek to better understand something.

I wonder if you ever spend time imagining how God might be wanting to shape you and your life? Are there any images that God is wanting to speak to you through? Jesus frequently used images and people's imaginations to teach and help bring about a clear understanding of the Kingdom of God. For me personally, I have found images important part of my discipleship. God speaking powerfully through them and accomplishing work within my life by communicating this way.

'Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work with us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.' [Ephesians 3:20-21]

What are we the church asking and imagining? Whatever it might be, let us be open to God who is able to do immeasurably more.



The Convocation—Deacon Nigel Perrott

Each year Deacons from across our connexion gather for their annual Convocation, in short convocation is a “gathering.

There are 260 members of the Methodist Diaconal Order, 161 are in active ministry across the UK.

Each year we eagerly await the four days in which we all come together to worship, pray and commune with each other. Deacons are members of a Religious Order, we do not have a “Mother House”, similar to other religious orders and are directly stationed to a particular context. This means we are a dispersed community, we live and serve in local communities’ right across our connexion. All Deacons are Ministers in the church, Ordained to a lifetime ministry of witness and service. The most distinctive of all, is our commitment to the Rule of Life which we all follow and which helps to bind us together that we may continue to become the people of God wants us to be both individually and as an Order. So we are apart, yet connected. In these uncertain times that must sound familiar.

This year our convocation, like many other meetings could not take place in the usual way. Thankfully, wonders of modern technology meant that we could meet “on-Line”. Over 200 members of the Order were able to join together and though apart, be together.

The convocation will always include the President and Vice President of the conference. This online meeting was no exception it was a delight to hear them lead Bible studies and lead us in worship. Rev Dr Jonathon Hustler, the Secretary of Conference also joined us.

Our days began with Morning Prayer, and ended with an Examen in the evening. Intertwined with worship and teaching, we had a quiz and even an online Panto!

Along with the fun and spiritual content, there is always a small amount of business that needs to take place. Each year the Convocation welcomes those to be Ordained at the annual conference. This year was no exception and I was humbled to be one of those being sent forward. In June, The conference will take place, though again, online. I will then be brought into “Full Connexion” and become a full member of The Methodist Diaconal Order. At some point before next year’s conference I will be Ordained. So for now, I am an Ordinand and no longer on probation!

I really could not sum up four days’ worth of teaching in this edition of the Herald. I would however, leave you with some thoughts that you could ponder over.
