Micah 4 v 1-4

But in the last days it will come about that the Temple Mount of the Lord will be firmly set as the leading mountain. It will be exalted above its surrounding hills, and people will stream toward it. Many nations will approach and say, 'Come, let's go up to the mountain of the Lord, and to the Temple of the God of Jacob. He will teach us about his ways, and we will walk according to his directions.' Indeed, the Law will proceed from Zion, and the message of the Lord from Jerusalem. And he will judge among many people, rebuking strong nations far away; and they will reshape their swords as ploughshares and their spears as pruning hooks. No nation will threaten another, nor will they train for war anymore. Instead, each man will sit in the shade of his grape vines and beneath the shade of his fig tree since the Lord of the heavenly armies has spoken.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. Reflection

On this Remembrance Sunday, we remember the fallen of two World Wars which left an indelible mark on the twentieth century and upon the lives of families and communities around the world.

A symbol of remembrance is sometimes served *by a monument of marble or a simple wooden cross*. In some instances, the names

of the fallen are etched in stone but, more poignantly, the lives of the fallen echo deep in the hearts of their family and friends.

Some of us are old enough to have recollections of those who served in the first world war but perhaps for many more of us, we will have heard stories told by parents and grandparents about their experiences in world war two. In my particular case, my father served in the RAF and was, for a time, in Rangoon in Burma, as it was then called. My mother, being that much younger than my father, was evacuated from London to Indian Queens in Cornwall for part of the war. Every family will have a story to tell and today is an opportunity to recall the tales of service and sacrifice that have shaped our personal history and experience of war. The wearing of a poppy is a reminder of this reality and a sign of hope for the future.

Thankfully, since the latter half of the 1940s, the world has experienced a long period of prosperity and peace which many of us have been privileged to enjoy. The danger is that we may have begun to take life for granted as a right rather than as a gift from God, a point I have often made at a funeral thanksgiving service. Perhaps Covid-19 is a timely reminder that life is indeed a gift from God which we should celebrate and cherish!

As we face the future with hope in our hearts, let us thank God for those who served in two world wars and subsequent conflicts, especially those known to us.

Let us thank God in this month of remembrance, with All Saints and All Souls, for the saints in light, who have run the race before us. Let us pray that they may rest in peace.

Today, may we recommit ourselves to God and humanity, so we turn *swords into ploughshares and spears into pruning hooks* as we sow seeds of love and peace in the hearts and lives of one another.
