Acts 2 v1-21, The Holy Spirit Comes

2 On the day of Pentecost all the believers were meeting together in one place.

² Suddenly, there was a sound from heaven like the roaring of a mighty windstorm, and it filled the house where they were sitting.

³ Then, what looked like flames or tongues of fire appeared and settled on each of them. ⁴ And everyone present was filled with the Holy Spirit and began speaking in other languages, as the Holy Spirit gave them this ability.

⁵ At that time there were devout Jews from every nation living in Jerusalem. ⁶ When they heard the loud noise, everyone came running, and they were bewildered to hear their own languages being spoken by the believers.

⁷ They were completely amazed. “How can this be?” they exclaimed. “These people are all from Galilee, ⁸ and yet we hear them speaking in our own native languages! ⁹ Here we are—Parthians, Medes, Elamites, people from Mesopotamia, Judea, Cappadocia, Pontus, the province of Asia, ¹⁰ Phrygia, Pamphylia, Egypt, and the areas of Libya around Cyrene, visitors from Rome ¹¹ (both Jews and converts to Judaism), Cretans, and Arabs. And we all hear these people speaking in our own languages about the wonderful things God has done!” ¹² They stood there amazed and perplexed. “What can this mean?” they asked each other.

¹³ But others in the crowd ridiculed them, saying, “They’re just drunk, that’s all!”

¹⁴ Then Peter stepped forward with the eleven other apostles and shouted to the crowd, “Listen carefully, all of you, fellow Jews and residents of Jerusalem! Make no mistake about this.

¹⁵ These people are not drunk, as some of you are assuming. 2.

Nine o’clock in the morning is much too early for that. ¹⁶ No, what you see was predicted long ago by the prophet Joel: ¹⁷ ‘In the last days,’ God says, ‘I will pour out my Spirit upon all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy. Your young men will see visions, and your old men will dream dreams.

¹⁸ In those days I will pour out my Spirit even on my servants—men and women alike—and they will prophesy.

¹⁹ And I will cause wonders in the heavens above and signs on the earth below— blood and fire and clouds of smoke.

²⁰ The sun will become dark, and the moon will turn blood red before that great and glorious day of the LORD arrives.

²¹ But everyone who calls on the name of the LORD will be saved.’

Talk

The disciples are waiting together, perhaps afraid to go out still. They have been commissioned by Jesus their Risen Lord, before He ascended back to heaven, to go out and preach the Gospel. But first they must wait for the Power from on High.

Did they discuss what it would be like, would they have been a bit nervous? I’m sure they would have been praying together, and reading the Scriptures, our Old Testament.

Then they experience a rushing wind and tongues of fire appearing over each one of them. God through His Spirit has empowered them. They are Spirit filled as individuals, but unified in its power.

Just as we, the Church worship in many ways, but are unified in our faith in Jesus our Lord and Rescuer.

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus is described as full of the Spirit, now it is stressed that the Spirit descends on all the disciples, on anyone who believes in Jesus.

The power of the Spirit has purified them, as if with fire and given them the ability to communicate the Good News.

Now, outside that Upper room, in Jerusalem, a festival was going on, celebrating the giving of the Law to Moses and the barley harvest.

So Jerusalem was crowded with people of many nationalities.

And as the people came to see what was happening, they heard the Good News of Jesus bringing salvation, each in their own language.

For the first time in their lives, this mixed crowd was hearing the Word of God in a way that struck straight home, and they could understand.

The power of the Spirit was such that it had given the disciples a message to reach every heart.

If we let it, the Spirit will set our hearts aflame to ignite the lives of others.

Just look at Peter what an example. He once thought he could never be forgiven for denying Jesus, but now forgiven, confident in Jesus' love for him, empowered by the Spirit, Peter comes forward to speak about this new thing God is doing.

That the prophecies of the Prophet Joel were being fulfilled. And they are still being fulfilled now. The 'Last Days' Joel refers to are now. They are the time between Jesus' Ascension and His return in glory.

Now the Spirit is released free throughout the entire world.

This day, Pentecost is called the Birthday of the Church.

We are the family of God. Though the empowering Spirit in our hearts, we can call our great creator God, 'Loving Father'.

Everyone who believes in Jesus and confesses Him as Lord has the Spirit.

Anyone, we are all one family.

God in the Spirit comes to us in many ways. Remember Elijah, the prophet, he expected God to answer him in fire and wind, but God came to him in a still small voice. God may speak to us in dramatic ways or gentle whispers, the important point is, that like those disciples we must wait patiently and always listen.

We have all gone through a testing time.

We need the Spirit's power and presence with us now to be the family of God, Jesus' body in the world;

living the love, joy and peace which the Spirit brings, God's grace and strength to carry us through.

As Paul says:-

'The Kingdom of God is living a life of goodness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit.'
