This means we have the opportunity to learn about their work, perhaps support them financially, and also prepare to use their resources to guide us through Lent this year. I thought it would be good to make sure those of our Circuit family not attending church in person, had the opportunity to share this experience too.

So today, we read about the work of Compassion, consider the compassion of Christ, and reflect on our own compassionate nature.

Lord, you assure us of your forgiveness, fill our lives with your holiness and your Holy Spirit, that our lives might echo your love and care for each other and all creation. Amen.

Compassion is a Christian children's charity. At their heart is a relentless compassion to empower every child left vulnerable by poverty. Their approach to fighting poverty is highly focused and personal. Since 1952, they've been giving children the opportunity to escape the suffering and fear poverty brings through one-to-one child sponsorship. They believe every child matters and deserves to be safe, fed, educated and empowered. Working in partnership with local churches in developing countries, a child in critical need is linked with a caring sponsor. Each sponsor enables Compassion to provide exceptional care for their sponsored child through every stage of their childhood.

The charity began when, on a war-torn Korean street in 1952, God moved Everett Swanson with compassion. Watching city workers scoop up what looked like piles of rags and throw them into the back of a truck, he walked over to take a closer look. Swanson was deeply troubled to see that the "piles" were not rags, but frozen bodies of orphans who had died overnight in the street.

On the airplane home, Swanson heard a simple message resounding in his head. As the engines whirred, he heard the challenge, "What are you going to do? What are you going to do?" over and over again. By the time his plane landed, Swanson had made a decision: God had moved him with compassion so he needed to take action. Swanson knew he could not turn his back on these children. He took a stand, vowing to find a way to help them. He raised money to support a Korean orphanage and soon established a unique programme, linking each Korean orphan with a caring individual whose generosity provided them with education, food, clothing, shelter and medical care. The very same belief drives the charity today. Swanson's initial act of compassion has grown to a movement releasing more than 2 million children from poverty in 25 developing countries. There are thousands of Compassion graduates who've been released from poverty

and are bringing change to their families, communities and nations.

Compassion wholeheartedly believes the Church matters. The Church is the only institution ordained by God Himself to bring his Kingdom to earth. It's God's plan to bring hope to a hurting world. That's why they work exclusively in partnership with local churches in developing countries to deliver their programmes. And why they work tirelessly to support and equip churches here in the UK to fulfil their mission.

A wonderful thing about this charity, is that by helping one child, all the family benefit, and later the community that child grew up in, can change for the better too.

In our Bible, there are quite a few instances where it is written "Jesus had compassion on them". I wondered which to choose as our focus today. Should it be the time he felt compassion for the crowd on the mountain

who listened to him for days – he fed them, all 5000. Or what about one of those deaf, blind, disabled, demon-possessed people whom Jesus healed. I decided on this on ...

Bible Reading Luke 7:11-17 Jesus Raises the Widow's Son at Nain

¹¹Soon afterwards he went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a large crowd went with him. ¹² As he approached the gate of the town, a man who had died was being carried out. He was his mother's only son, and she was a widow; and with her was a large crowd from the town. 13 When the Lord saw her, he had compassion for her and said to her, "Do not weep." 14 Then he came forward and touched the bier, and the bearers stood still. And he said, "Young man, I say to you, rise!" 15 The dead man sat up and began to speak, and Jesus gave him to his mother. 16 Fear seized all of them; and they glorified God, saying, "A great prophet has risen among us!" and "God has looked favourably on his people!" 17 This word about him spread throughout Judea and all the surrounding country.

Word

Jesus arrives at Nain, at the town's gate, where he no doubt stepped aside as a funeral procession approaches. There's a cart with a body placed on it, and behind a mourner – a women, distraught, full of grief. There are others behind her, but no one beside her supporting her in her grief. Jesus feels the same compassion that Everett Swanson did when he saw the bodies in the back of the truck. Those children had no one to mourn them, but this son does. A mother, standing alone. Jesus has compassion for her, not just because her son has died, but also for the change in her circumstances she may face. A widow in those days has no State Pension, no Bereavement Benefit, might even become homeless if there are no close family members prepared to take her in. Many widows could end up begging on the street to survive. In his

compassion Jesus is urged to action. "Don't weep" he tells, and going to the bier he says "Wake up, young man, arise!". The crowd were amazed, the mother rejoiced, and the son was no doubt glad to be feeling well again. The compassion that Jesus felt has an effect on everyone present, and when we are compassionate it can be a benefit for many. The Compassion charity find that by helping one child, they also help the whole family. There are better life chances for them all, which can also be seen in the community too. As others see what is happening, they may seek to find sponsorship for their family too. They learn new ways of employment, how to keep healthy and the children grow to become valued members of the community by bringing new skills and better prosperity. By returning the son to his mother, Jesus has improved her life chances, but there may have been others to benefit too. Was he married, or about to wed, so had others to support, did he have a skill that many relied on? The compassion shown by Jesus can reach far, because compassion urges action. A caring response that can seek to help, to heal, to combat injustice. This is very much part of what it is to live in God's kingdom, and often happens to us as we go about our daily lives. Meeting someone in the street, or speaking on the phone, we hear of someone who is struggling and would welcome our friendly voice and support. We hear on radio and TV about issues we feel strongly about, and compassion urges us to write to our MP or donate to charity. Most of all, it compels us to pray. We can't always see a way we can help, but our compassion for injustice does mean we can bring our prayers to God, He will always listen, and find the answer. Where will your compassionate nature lead you today – in action or prayer?
