




Ripon And Lower Dales Circuit Newsletter

Worship Album Highlight Resound Worship "Doxecology" Released 1st Sept 2020

"Resound Worship is a collective of British worship songwriters, established in 2006, seeking to resource the church with songs that engage heart, mind and soul". A couple of years ago the group identified a scarceness in the worship song/hymn repertoire around the topic of ecology and the created world, and set about building a collection of especially written songs. The newly released album might never have happened as lockdown restriction blew all the carefully laid plans for arranging and recording the songs, but technology and determination prevailed!

The album consists of thirteen songs, all on the theme, but surprisingly varied in style and content. All will make you think, and have the potential to take us to a different place in worship of the creator God. Also available to accompany the album is a study book, service outlines, music book and backing tracks. A truly useful resource.

As only the Holy Spirit can do, this set is released at exactly the same time as the new Methodist Prayer Handbook – "The Earth is the Lords", and would be a worthy companion.

As you will be aware, there are many countries that persecute Christians and being openly Christian is illegal.

The seeds that were sown

I have fond memories of Ripon and the surrounding area, of Kirkby Malzeard that was my home for nearly a year, and of Fountains Abbey where I spent many days serving food and cleaning tables. Many seeds were sown during that year, from 1998-1999, when I and 3 strangers came to live in the village and form a 'Seed Team'. I often wonder what came of those seeds, how many took roots and grew.

A central part of our mission year involved opening 'The Net' youth club and running a Youth Alpha group in Kirkby Malzeard, and launching 'Maximum Velocity' youth services that outgrew the Chapel and moved into Allhallowgate Methodist Church. I often wonder what happened to those youth who must now be in their 20s and 30s. Perhaps you are one of them!

I also remember visiting people in the village, sitting in their living rooms and listening to their stories, and the weekly coffee morning we held in our front room because the bus stop was just outside. Sharing the story of Daniel's friends in the fiery furnace for Bonfire Night at the toddler group will always stick in my mind – the looks on everyone's faces when we shared their funny names and how God saved them from the fire!

And meeting the youth group in Ripon, making friends, growing together as a team, allowing God to take me out of my comfort zone and to reveal things about me, my character and my skills that He could use. Seeds were sown in my own life that year!

For one, I saw how significant a small local chapel can be in reaching out to its community, and that planted a seed to encourage local churches in their day to day mission – I am now part-way through training as a local preacher and I hope that the services I lead are encouraging and equipping to be witnesses in our communities. Second, the year of mission certainly wasn't a 'year out' but a 'year in', in which a seed for mission was sown. I now work for mission organisation OM (Operation Mobilisation), encouraging people to partner in Global mission, through praying, giving or going. And third, I married a local boy from Ripon, and we have 2 wonderful children!

The Church didn't close, only the buildings.

This month churches within the circuit have begun opening the doors to their buildings once more and welcoming people to gather physically distanced for acts of worship. Other churches continue to prepare for the time that is right for their context, with plans in place for reopening in October. Some have been able to attend services, whilst others continue to shield themselves or another.

Many have drawn upon the blessings of the locally written worship at home service, valuing the shared prayers, hymns and reflection whether online, at home or in a church building. The sense of a community of faith across the circuit ever deepens as we support and pray for each other.

We cannot but acknowledge the difficulties, the doubts, the fear and anxieties known past and present. Nor can we ignore the government guidance which determines the do's and don'ts, quite often leaving one feeling like we a being met by a heap load of 'can not's'.

Yet, we have made new discoveries in ways of being church and living out our faith. We have discovered a new path in the written and recorded worship services, with its origins being in a response to worshipping in the pandemic but now being about developing worship on the 'www' (world wide web). Might we begin to see the www dot, to represent something else for the church, perhaps, worship word welcomingwitness. Okay, a cheeky hyphen used on the last one, but nonetheless, we a treading on a path less travelled previously by the circuit.

The possibilities and potential of how God can use this is great. Maybe it is a way of sharing with other family members who otherwise would not usually attend a physically gathered church service. I would encourage everyone to raise a torch for these services, that we would point people towards God and commit to praying for those new to, seeking or exploring the Christian faith.

The Synod of Yorkshire North and East District took place online on Saturday the 12th of September in the form of a Webinar. All the circuit representatives were log on and present for what proved to be an excellent and inspirational time. Revd. Ian Pruden was welcomed to the District's Synod along with others beginning new appointments. We heard powerful testimonies which led us to think about diversity, social action and how God uses the creative arts with poetry being recited from a young person at Brimham Rocks. Synod began with worship that was led by the North Yorkshire Coast circuit which set our hearts and minds upon God. We voted by raising our hands at the push of a button and felt a sense of belonging to something bigger and of God. Not least, in response to the Climate Emergency, Synod made a commitment for the District to become a net zero Carbon District, working towards 2040 for this goal but starting from now. So inspired, I bought a wooden toothbrush with natural fibres instead of a plastic one and now I am the proud owner of a green smile. More information about Synod and the encouraging resources for local churches will be shared over the coming month.

To begin: place your finger at the opening of the labyrinth and either in silence or aloud offer your prayer of confession. As we say sorry to God in prayer, we allow space to hear God speak forgiveness into our hearts through Jesus Christ Our Lord.

Entering: slowly trace your finger along the pattern of the labyrinth and as you journey towards the centre, prayerfully reflect about your journeying with God. You might want to consider a particular time in your life or even focus upon something in your life which you are seeking God for guidance.

At the centre: stop, pause and sit awhile, simply be with God. Take time to breath and listen for God speaking. Possibly in words or images, or by giving you peace.

Return journeying: once again, slowly trace your finger along the pattern of the labyrinth and this time as you journey outwards, let your prayers be outward looking. Offer your prayers for others, near and far.

Going: to conclude your time of prayer journeying the labyrinth, consider saying a prayer of praise and thanksgiving. Go in peace.
