Bible Readings

Mark 7: 1-8

¹ The Pharisees and some of the teachers of the law who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus ² and saw some of his disciples eating food with hands that were defiled, that is, unwashed. ³ (The Pharisees and all the Jews do not eat unless they give

their hands a ceremonial washing, holding to the tradition of the elders. 4 When they come from the marketplace they do not eat unless they wash. And they observe many other traditions, such as the washing of cups, pitchers and kettles.) 5 So the Pharisees and teachers of the law asked Jesus, "Why don't your disciples live according to the tradition of the elders instead of eating their food with defiled hands?" 6 He replied, "Isaiah was right when he prophesied about you hypocrites; as it is written: "'These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me. 7 They worship me in vain; their teachings are merely human rules.' 8 You have let go of the commands of God and are holding on to human traditions."

James 1:17-27

¹⁷ Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows. 18 He chose to give us birth through the word of truth, that we might be a kind of firstfruits of all he created. 19 My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, ²⁰ because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires. ²¹ Therefore, get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent and humbly accept the word planted in you, which can save you. ²² Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. 23 Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like someone who looks at his face in a mirror 24 and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like. 25 But whoever looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues in it— not forgetting what they have heard, but doing it—they will be blessed in what they do. ²⁶ Those who consider themselves religious and yet do not keep a tight rein on their tongues deceive themselves, and their religion is worthless. ²⁷ Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and

widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world.

Word

Because of Covid, we are all regularly washing hands more, and have been encouraged to do this for the length it takes to sing 'Happy Birthday' or some other short tune. You may have done that for a while at the start, but I expect you haven't made it a life long tradition! Jesus took the Pharisees to task, because their focus was on following manmade traditions such as cleansing and not eating prohibited foods. They had so many rules and regulations that 10 important ones got overlooked – the ten commandments from God. By spending so much much time telling others what they should or shouldn't do, being critical and self-righteous, they weren't teaching how to love one another and therefore weren't taking care of those in need in their community – the widows, the orphans, the sick. In fact not even their own family.

Jesus will continue by saying that it is not what goes into a body that is unclean, but what comes out of the heart that makes a person unclean. Evil thoughts, unkind or angry words, greed, lust, theft, all these bad things are not avoided just because you washed your hands in a ritualistic way, or ate the right food. What needs to be taken into ourselves regularly, is the Word of God, inwardly digested, then it will come out in our words of love and care, followed by our actions of compassion and seeking justice. But it is easy for us to become critical of others, we can become as hypocritical as the Pharisees if we aren't careful.

James teaches us that we need to control ourselves, be quick to listen, think before we speak, be patient and slow to anger. How do we do this? Begin by taking in the word of God; read our Bibles, listen attentively to our preachers (we do appreciate that!), but we need to do more than just listen. James gives this image of a man seeing himself in a mirror - remember in those days very few people

would have one, so he looks closely at hinmself for a while, but then forgets what he looks like shortly afterwards. We can become a Nominal Christian if we only listen in church on Sunday, but don't follow through in our actions on Monday to Saturday. We can all too soon forget, when we think of the things that aren't from God – our wordly life takes over. James continues by saying that if we regard ourselves as religious, but don't control our tongue, we are deceiving ourselves. Do you remember chanting "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me" in a school playground? We teach children this, but it's not actually true. A broken bone is quickly mended these days, but a hurtful comment, or constant putdowns, especially in a bullying way, can cause life long damage.

It's all too easy to say the wrong thing, even when we are trying to help, but if we listen more first, then our more carefully chosen words can be much more meaningful. And then our love, compassion and care – those Christian values we aspire to, will be visible. James speaks of God accepting our religion – in other words, our belief in Him, as being pure and faultless if our words are followed by actions that match – looking after orphans and widows in their distress, James tells those early Christians.

For us today, following Jesus' ethical and moral teaching, can mean even more work – from considering how our purchases effect climate change, sustainable farming and fair trade, to helping our immediate neighbours in need, or to supporting charities around the world. Not forgetting praying for all these, and for areas of severe poverty, famine and war. We can feel that is a large ask, but perhaps there is an issue close to your heart that you feel you could speak up about, support with a gift of time or money – and pray for over the next week or two.

You could even demonstrate that your faith is positive and joyful by the simple act of smiling to everyone you meet, asking how they are – and listen carefully to their reply, without

comment or advice, and offering to pray for them if that seems appropriate. Can you take the time to show that your heart is full of Christ's love this week. Amen.
