



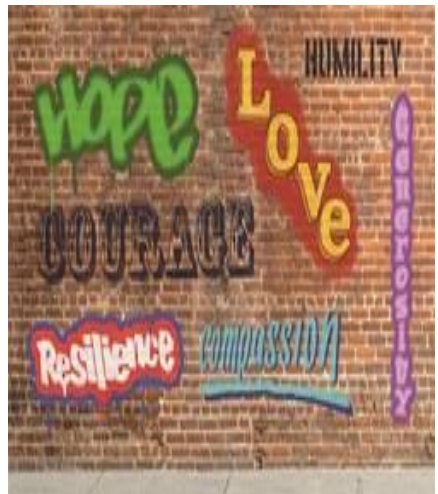

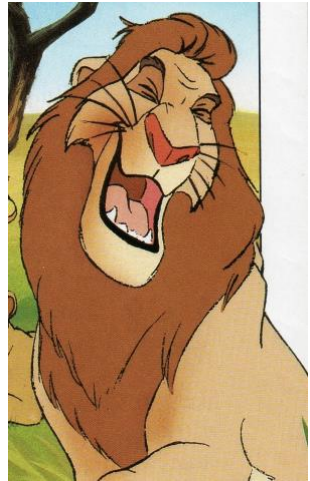

Message from Revd. Gareth

My Grandma would always say that if March comes in like a lion, it will go out like a lamb. Well, if any have been at an all-age worship service with me here in this circuit, you might have met LEO the

Yorkshire lion. And if you are interested or before you criticize the stereotypical lion's name, LEO acts as an acronym for Love Each Other. Whilst a lion might not be the first creature you think of when it comes to love, unless you are a fan of the C.S. Lewis book 'The Lion, the witch and the Wardrobe, from The Chronicles of Narnia'. A lion reminds us that love isn't all soft, fluffy and heart shaped, that love takes courage.



Setting aside the weather, the beginning of March is the start of Lent, with Ash Wednesday on the second day of the month this year. Ash Wednesday, also known as the Day of Ashes, provides a solemn reminder of one's mortality and space to focus one's heart and mind on repentance and prayer. Holding before us our need for reconciliation with God. The call to 'Repent and believe in the Gospel' sets us off on the Lenten path towards Holy Week and Easter. The Lenten season is an opportunity for embarking on a Spiritual journey, which might include fasting. Fasting as part of our Christian discipline is accompanied by an increase in our prayer life. We give something up to make more time and space for spending with God. I believe this is an outworking of one's love for God, just as when we give in service of God comes from a place of love for God.

Furthermore, let us not forget the reason for lent, that following the baptism of Jesus, 'Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished.' (Matthew 4:1-2). In the gospel according to Luke, chapter four, we read that Jesus was full of the Holy Spirit and was led by the Spirit. Will lent be a

time when we are open to being led by the Holy Spirit. Jesus was and is victorious over the devil; over evil and over death. A victory which we see runs throughout Jesus' life on earth, tempted in everyway as we are, yet without sin. When fully man, when he was famished, and when he had been in the wilderness being tempted for forty days and forty nights, Jesus remains fully dependent upon God. Jesus does not turn to the easy path, turning stones into bread for a quick, temporary satisfaction but remains sustained by God. Jesus doesn't put God to the test, He has no reason too, nor would he be deceived to forgo the Scriptures. Jesus both fully man and fully God remains fully committed to the purpose for which He came to earth. His Mission was the Mission of God, the devil failed, "Away with you, Satan!" for it is written, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him,"

I have only dipped into these two passages from the gospels according to Matthew and Luke. They are worth spending time with, prayerfully considering firstly, what Jesus went through for you and secondly, how we respond to the temptations in our own lives. How do you pursue God in your life?

Do we look to God to satisfy and feed our spiritual hunger? Do we rely upon God, trusting in God to provide or do we look to our own strength, which is weakness compared to God.

Are we open to God and prepared for our relationship with God to be shaped by God? Or do we put obstacles in the way, making excuses in attempt to justify our ungodly behaviours which neither reflect Christ nor give glory to God?

Will we consider what worshipping God means, putting away the traits of a consumer to allow ourselves to be emersed in the loving presence of God and being led by the Holy Spirit. Will we reflect on who we serve, seeking God to guide the where and how?

I began this reflection in true a British fashion, by talking about

how the weather comes in like a lion during March. There is a plethora of references to lions, lionesses, and cubs in the Bible. With many of the references recognising their fierce roaring nature as predators. We also have the image of the lion eating straw like the ox, together with the calf. We have an image in Isaiah of wild beasts tamed, of destructive natures transformed. The prophesy of Isaiah is pointing to Christ Jesus bringing peace on earth and of God's Peaceful Kingdom. Christ died; Christ is risen; and Christ will come again. Christ Jesus is the way; and the truth; and the life, no one comes to the Father except through Jesus. It is through Jesus Christ that we have reconciliation with God. So, this lent, may we know the grace of God and journey through it with courage to love God, to let go and let God lead, that we too would know the transformation that Christ brings into our lives. Regardless of how the weather comes in during March, we always go out following the Lamb of God. And might we remember LEO the Yorkshire lion and Love Each Other. **Amen.**

New Beginnings

Have you ever wished that you could have a new life? Whether it is the reality of your present circumstance, the ghost of your past, or the uncertainty of your future, sometimes it is appealing to wish that you could wake up tomorrow with a brand-new life. All of today's problems gone and a future full of promises.

Too good to be true?

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! (2 Corinthians 5:17)

When Jesus died and rose again, He promised to send His Spirit to dwell within those who declared Him Lord and Saviour. When the Spirit comes to live inside believers, they are made into "new creations" – made clean spiritually from their sin and shame.

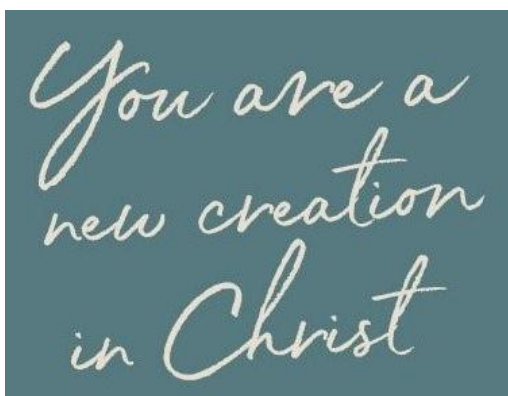

News From Canada

How time flies. It does not seem very long ago since I was discussing with Amanda the possibility of a letter from Canada being published in The Circuit Herald and here we are at episode three. This month it has been written by Rhianne, my granddaughter, as Andrew, her husband is responsible for the sheep side of the farm. Here in North Yorkshire we are very familiar with seeing sheep in every other field, but in Canada sheep farms are few and far between, so it should be interesting to hear about their experiences. Read on and enjoy... ..

“I think we’re ready to start milking now.”

It was 7.30am. I was in the middle of whipping up some eggs for breakfast while checking that Posie hadn’t left her lunch in the fridge (again!). Andrew was still in the barn penning up more ewes and new lambs. He had just realised that sufficient ewes had now lambed to enable him to get the milking parlour into action. His text came through to me at the most inopportune moment of the morning!

It was the culmination of almost 8 months of preparation. The idea started as a casual conversation in a farm shop and had now turned into a very real, hopefully profitable, division of the farm. Once lambing was complete, we could be milking 170 ewes in 3 different batches. All the milk going to a local, artisan dairy shop. Interestingly, it is also owned by another ex-pat family!

It was an easy decision as Andrew is obsessed with sheep. Being a sheep farmer is his passion, so having this opportunity is a once in a lifetime experience. Despite all the huge time and commitment involved, he is very excited. We already had the milking parlour set up for goats which needed minimal changes to accommodate

sheep. Lamb prices also being at an all-time high and the sheep industry in Canada rapidly increasing, it seemed a good time to embark upon this venture.

By far the hardest step was to find the sheep. They're not as readily available as they are in Yorkshire, but we had some insider knowledge. The Mennonite community had decided to buy some land in Wisconsin and were moving away, but--- they weren't taking all their sheep with them.

The Mennonite community is very similar to the Amish community. They lead very simple lifestyles; no electricity, no internet, and many of them don't own cars. They choose to get around with a horse and buggy. They are always quiet and reserved, and they speak with gentle German accent. Their dress is also simple. The women are typically attired in long dresses and bonnets, while the men wear shirts with braces and have very long beards. Their community revolves around the church. The move to Wisconsin was a community decision. Not all the Mennonites we spoke to agree with the move, but as a community, it was to be a majority decision, so they were eventually persuaded that it was for the good of all.

Dealing with them has been a completely new experience!! To start with, they don't use telephones, so the only point of contact was going to see them (most of them were about 40 mins drive away) or calling at a neighbouring farm and asking them to pass the message on. Marc and Andrew began by driving round to their farms and leaving our business card. That was all it took!! Two days later, Andrew had over six different Mennonite farmers call him and ask if he could stop by some time and see their sheep. Even when we had bought all the sheep we wanted, the calls didn't stop!

At the time of purchase, the community wasn't planning to move until much later in the autumn, which worked perfectly for us. We could get most of the harvest done and more importantly to me, we were in the middle of planning our wedding and I didn't want

him taking time off that!!! But you know what they say about the “The best laid plans of mice and men”. The Mennonites decided to move early and wanted the sheep gone ASAP. Specifically, the week before our wedding!!!

For those of you that don’t know, we were married in August last year. We had the service in the woods on our farm and the reception in our garden. As you can imagine, with all the preparations, the last thing I needed was Andrew heading off to pick up multiple loads of sheep!!

We had no choice. Marc and Andrew collected the majority, but I went with Andrew for the last load. I remember sitting in the passenger seat of the truck with the trailer backed up to an old barn. There was no-one around – a bit like “The Marie Celeste”. A neighbour had needed some assistance, so the entire family had disappeared to help. We were just sat waiting---and waiting. Then I noticed some movement out of the corner of my eye, and down the hill came a group of about 20 men in huge wellies, straw hats, shirts with the sleeves rolled up, and some of the biggest beards I have ever seen. It was quite a sight and certainly brought home to me the diversity in culture that we are lucky to live in here. Once the sheep were all home, peace descended. I remember thinking “We’re ready to start milking now.”

Well, there you have it. The sheep have all been bought and the scene is set for the milking to start. Rhianne will be writing about their first experience of “sheep milking” in the April edition.



Kathy's Corner

At Bedale & District, our children's work used to revolve around Messy Church, which I enjoyed being involved with – but it's hard work. You need a good team of volunteers if you want to prepare 6 activities, and a meal too. By the time Gareth arrived in our Circuit, the few volunteers left were feeling somewhat jaded and weary. Gareth suggested we try Lego Church instead, but Covid got in the way. Finally, we've been able to begin this new initiative - after I spent several weeks ordering Lego bricks from Ebay. That had my postman querying what was I up to, with all these rattly parcels!

Lego Journeys began last November, and I love it as much as the children do. We have settled into a format which seems to work well, beginning in the church with an introduction to the theme before telling a Bible story. The children are getting confident at reading the words too, which is good, especially when some scripture can be done as a drama reading. We suggest a few ideas for building the story, then head off into the hall to get creative with the Lego – or Duplo for the younger ones. The adults seem to enjoy it too.



We bring our completed models into church, to place on the Communion table for a short act of worship, song and prayer. Then it's time for refreshments and home-made cookies – the chocolate cookies and shortbread (dairy-free) being most popular.

We have a delightful toddler, who quickly realised we bring our models to Jesus – he fetches his through without being told. And the older ones have been so creative, making their own Advent lights, a Nativity scene at Christmas; hearts for 'Love your neighbour', a Temple for Jesus to hide from his parents in, which was so large it just about filled the table – I reckon Solomon would have been impressed with our skills! Our last session had them making very large fish to retell Jonah's story. (We have a budding engineer who designed a whale with hinged mouth to open wide!)

It's great to see their imaginations leading to some interesting models – and good discussions are developing too, as we talk about the scripture. It is proving to be a good way of introducing Jesus to young families, encouraging them on their journey of faith – one brick at a time. - **Blessings Kathy Lowrie**

Allhallowgate - Mid-February and as I prepare this news item for March edition of the Circuit Herald, I can't help but look at the increasing number of spring flowers displaying colour in the garden. Happily, it reminds me of the increasing number of congregants returning to services and filling the pews with colour and hope as we start to prepare for lent and all that follows from it.

Below you will see information about the work of The Ripon City of Sanctuary group which is based at AHG. It is also flourishing and doing wonderful work. Any contributions of the required items would be very welcome. The collection boxes are in the Victoria Grove foyer

The Ripon City of Sanctuary Group - has been collecting clothes for asylum seekers and refugees for over 6 years and is now collecting for centres in Hull (2 centres), Leeds, Middlesbrough and Wakefield. Each centre receives a carload approximately monthly. The greatest need presently is for male winter clothing. Those receiving clothes are typically young with roughly a 70% male 30% female ratio. There is a lesser need for clothing for children. We are not collecting bedding because of lack of storage space in the centres. We are most grateful that Ripon has the reputation at the centres of providing good quality clothes and shoes. This notice is one of thanks for the wonderful response year after year, but also a request that a further search for good quality winter clothes might lead to our making deliveries in March. I am very happy to answer any query.

It was felt to be a good starting point as there are several members of the church already living on the estate. The idea is to feed back on their experience to see how it might be adapted and used more widely in the outlining Villages i.e., the district part of our Church. So please pray for us as we start this new and exciting opportunity and watch this space for the exciting opportunities that lie ahead.

Snape - We have appreciated our month of themed services on the 4 pillars of our faith. We've also appreciated the follow up midweek sessions, which have been a time of sharing. Sunshine Corner (the children's after school group) is going well with up to 20 children aged 5 to 11 every other Friday. We have lots of noisy fun, with crafts, games etc etc all based around a children's story. Each session is so varied, from making sheep's masks and then using them to act out the story of the good shepherd to making biscuits etc etc..... All good fun. It's amazing how the children surprise you and some of the noisiest little ones who you think haven't taken anything in, then surprise you with the most amazing questions or answers. We're thankful for each one of them.

High Ellington Chapel - It is at this time of year that we finally begin to see the signs of oncoming spring. The daffodils are beginning to poke through the soil, the days are gradually getting longer, and the birds are starting to sing a little louder. For farmers, this time of year marks the onset of the busy period. Sheep, now heavily in lamb, need constant care and attention, feeding and monitoring. Within a few weeks, the lambs will start to arrive and then the work really sets in. It is important to take time out when things get busy to contemplate what really matters and to recharge. Often church provides this brief relief from our busy lives, giving us time to sit and reflect. At Ellington chapel, we pride ourselves on the beautiful location of our church, where you can hear the birds singing, sheep bleating, and the occasional car attempt to get past. As time goes on, our chapel needs constant maintenance, and the time has come to repaint the outside so that all may view our church for its full beauty. Reflection from Revd. Gareth

Lent can see a time of giving something up, fasting from chocolate or choosing to make a lifestyle change in pursuit of self-development or self-improvement. The motivation for entering a period of self-denial is different for each person. Ultimately for Christians the practice is firmly connected with recalling how Jesus, led by the Holy Spirit, spent forty days and nights in the wilderness and was tempted by the devil. And whilst many enter the Lenten season with a prayerfully considered approach, for many people their circumstance determines their experience of wilderness. I have written the following reflection/poem in response to my thoughts of others needs and how important it is not to judge one another but instead seek to understand and show compassion. It's offered for reflection and prayer. Grace and Peace, **Revd. Gareth**

To each a wilderness

To the parent with limited supply a mountain of demand.

To the housebound a home that's become a wilderness that surrounds.

To the lonely a deafening silence and gripping lack of touch.

To the homeless an obscene amount of consumerism, and others that have enough.

To the unemployed a wrestle with a sense of value, purpose, and self-worth.

To the ill an invasion threatening limitations of how life is lived.

To the business owner a bunker in an economic storm.

To the worker in poverty a landscape of despair, wondering why and how, whilst asking if anybody cares.

To the poor an empty plain, no opportunity, no voice, no nowt.

To the refuge a hostile stare, a camp locked in hopelessness
whist carrying memories and emotional injuries of what life was
before.

To each a wilderness, different in how it looks, feels, smells and
sounds.

All our senses exposed to its elements which by its very nature is
uncontrollably wild and devouring emotions.

We often can only imagine what another's wilderness place is
like.

We struggle sometimes to have empathy as we ourselves are
overwhelmed by the wilderness which is ours.

Whilst others may not hear our cry for help, or we hear the cry of
another.

And when it's a track we must travel, May we know the comfort
and strength of God

And let our prayers be the words we have and if we become lost
for words for emotions run too deep, May the Holy Spirit
intercede.

And may we hold fast to the faith we have been given, drawing
strength to rejoice when it is but the size of a mustard seed.
