Reading **Luke 18: 1 – 8**

Reflection

Pray without ceasing – don't give up!

Pomegranates', how do you eat yours? Recently I enjoyed a pomegranate from the local greengrocers. As I stood preparing this beautiful fruit by carefully deseeding the red jewels and remembered how growing up, we would eat these with a sewing pin, one jewel at a time. Whichever of these ways you choose to eat this fruit they both require the same thing, perseverance.

Perseverance is the theme that runs through are readings. Being a prophet in Old Testament times particularly, popularity didn't often come with the call that God placed upon you to deliver his message. Jeremiah was most definitely unpopular and had a rough time. He was arrested, during the Babylonian siege of Jerusalem he was imprisoned. He got chucked into a cistern and left to die, he sees his unpopular prophecy take place as God as shown him with Jerusalem falling to the Babylonians and to top it all off, he is taken to Egypt by force. And yet, amidst the stark warnings, we come to these verses and a message of hope. Jeremiah persevered through all that he endured and remained obedient to speaking that which God placed in his mouth speak.

In this passage from Jeremiah, chapter 31, we can see the perseverance of God which speaks of a sure hope that will come through the steadfastness of God who will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and the generations that follow. From a time of being uprooted and torn down to being built up and planted, from a time of experiencing destruction and disaster, to being established. The Lord declares that this will be transformed through а new covenant relationship that will see people knowing God. That this relationship with God will be established through His law being put in the minds and written on their hearts. That people will become mindful, thoughtful, and more aware of God's law and to the point that it will be the life within them. It will be that which connects people with God.

Why does God want us to have such a connected relationship with Him? Love. God loves you. God so loved the world that he gave his one and Only Son. We love because he

first loved us. We could go on to reference all that reminds us of how God love us.

In our gospel reading we read how Jesus taught to come to God, showing how the perseverance of a widow with only justice and her repetitive petitioning of the unjust Judge eventually got the response and action that the widow required to get justice. This unjust Judge does not compare to God who loves us.

Earlier in the Luke, Jesus points out that 'If you then, though you are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!' (Luke 11:13)

When we pray and pray like Jesus taught, we come to our Father in heaven who knows us better than we know ourselves; who knows what we need and who loves us. We have a new covenant, a relationship with God our Father, the Holy Spirit and Jesus Christ because God made a way. Jesus paid the price for our sins upon the cross, and through Christ our redeemer we have forgiveness. We still come to God in repentance and confess our sins. We can share the words of Paul in Galatians, 'I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me.' (Galatians 2:20).

In the prologue of John's gospel, we read that the Word was and is God. That Jesus the Word of God became flesh. Therefore, we must read the Old Testament and New Testament with the lens of knowing Jesus is the living Word, who came to fulfil the law and the prophets. We must look back and look ahead with proper recognition of the person of Jesus Christ who lives in us. When we die to sin and live for Christ, Christ lives in us.

Today I want us all to be encouraged to pray without ceasing, and don't give up. There is no denying the darkness which we are witnessing in the world. The speed in which we get to know about world affairs and the volume of shocking, upsetting and deeply concerning news is overwhelming. But let us turn to God in response, pray without ceasing, and don't give up. Our own personal circumstances can sometimes be overwhelming too, we perhaps offer love, care and support to those we know

and love. I want to us all to be encouraged to pray without ceasing and don't give up.

In our relationship with our loving God, we can come to God in all circumstances, in joy and sorrow. So, in perseverance let us pray without ceasing and don't give up, because God never gives up on us, on you. And as we continue through perseverance, as we repent from our sins finding salvation in Jesus and strength in the Holy Spirit, may we find a character that is fruitful with the Fruit of the Spirit and live in the Hope of God that does not disappoint.

Unlike our perseverance with eating pomegranates that are in season from October to January, perseverance in faith is always in season. Amen.
