- When Jesus came to Jordan to be baptised by John, he did not come for pardon, but as his Father's Son. He came to share repentance with all who mourn their sins, to speak the vital sentence with which good news begins.

Reflection

Jesus comes to the River Jordan and is baptized by John, who is reluctant because he thinks Jesus should baptize him.

The baptism of Jesus is a wonderful image of Jesus' submission. Jesus knew that to demonstrate his obedience he needed to go through John's water of repentance. As he came up out of the water, he heard the words that showed God's attitude towards him: 'my Son...with whom I am well pleased'.

The baptism of Jesus is one of the few events in his ministry recorded in all four Gospels. The picture of Jesus offering himself as the Messiah begins in the River Jordan, when he bows his head humbly to receive a baptism for the forgiveness of sins. This moment of his baptism indicates the beginning of his ministry, and yet it also reflects the tone of his whole life.

He chooses to walk the same path as those who came out into the desert to listen to John the Baptist, hoping to hear God's promises. He chooses to make this quiet yet definite beginning to his life of service.

John's question to Jesus is understandable: 'I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?' Jesus' answer reflects the Isaiah 42 picture of bringing forth justice without extinguishing even a smouldering wick. 'Let it be so now' – this quiet, humble path is the beginning of the fulfilment of 'righteousness'. We often give this word a personal religious meaning, but 'righteousness' also means putting things right judicially, acting with an emphasis on fairness – the justice that God's Servant would bring. The 'bringing forth' of justice in Isaiah 42: 1 and 4 is described as a quiet, faithful process rather than a violent conquering of injustice. The new things that 'spring forth' are described in a way that means to sprout up like a sapling that will become a tree. The power of this 'bringing forth' of justice is in its faithful accomplishment, the servant is so constant and gentle that he will not break a bruised reed.

Jesus coming to John at the River Jordan marks an important moment in the Gospels. This is where it all really starts (indeed, Mark's Gospel does start here), as we get a glimpse into the purposes of God and why Jesus came. And it's noticeable that Jesus doesn't start with 'all guns blazing'. Quite the reverse. The Son of God begins his ministry with an act of submission, one that John was clearly not expecting as his question shows.

Jesus, it would seem, needed to start his ministry with the right attitude: submission to God's will. Without this, the mission of salvation could not have been accomplished. Submission, these days, may be confused with being a doormat, letting others walk all over you. But this is the complete opposite of what Jesus was doing. Submission to God's will means knowing and doing what is good and right and true, even when others laugh at you, think you are mad; even oppose and intimidate you, perhaps physically. That requires great strength - of character, of mind, of purpose. Strength and determination. Submission to God's will is not 'gentle Jesus meek and mild'. Remember, this is the man who overturned the tables of the moneychangers!

Jesus came, we are told, 'to fulfil all righteousness' – to fulfil all justice, a justice that comes from the heart of God. Jesus is on the side of the weak, the helpless, those on the margins. Jesus is the servant as described in the words of the Isaiah passage. Fulfilling all justice and righteousness means doing things the way God wants them to be done. Jesus' commitment to this, his submission, is enacted in the ritual of John's baptism. And God's response is clear. 'This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' This short message must have spoken deep joy into Jesus' soul. He knew God was with him. He knew where he was going. His heart and mind were in the right place. He was ready to start his ministry now.

And our call is the same. We need the same attitude of humility and submission to the will of God, the same desire for justice that comes from the heart of God, and – through the power of the Spirit within us – the same strength and determination to see it though, as Jesus did.

Are you ready to start?
