READING: Matthew 14:22-33

22 Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. ²³And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, ²⁴but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. ²⁵And early in the morning he came walking towards them on the lake. ²⁶But when the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified, saying, 'It is a ghost!' And they cried out in fear. ²⁷But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid.'

28 Peter answered him, 'Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water.' ²⁹He said, 'Come.' So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came towards Jesus. ³⁰But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, 'Lord, save me!' ³¹Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, 'You of little faith, why did you doubt?' ³²When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. ³³And those in the boat worshipped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God.'

READING: Romans 10:13-15

¹³For, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

14 But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? ¹⁵And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!'

REFLECTION

The most obvious statement that can be made is that in order to walk on water you have to get out of the boat. It's a statement that has been around for many years, you may be familiar with it, or this might be the first time you've read it. No matter which camp you're in I think it's fair to say that it has been used as a criticism as well as an encouragement.

I prefer the encouragement and here's why!

Jesus walked on water, he did so to reach his disciples where they were, in the middle of a storm. He had sent the disciples off in the boat to have some alone time with his father, God. When evening came, he was alone and the boat was far from land, then notice it was 'in the early morning he came walking towards them'.

I guess he could have stood on the edge of the water and waited for them to reach him, for them to work it out and get to him. However, I don't think that's the compassionate Jesus we read about and know. There was time for them to try going it alone, without help, depending on their own resources, how often do we take that option?

Jesus could have stretched out his hands and commanded the wind to cease but then would Peter have stepped out of the boat and shown the faith and trust that he did.

In verse 26 we see that the disciples didn't know, they couldn't make out who, or what, it was that they were seeing as they began to make out something approaching them. And, I'm deducing from their reaction that they certainly weren't expecting it to be Jesus ... I think we can safely suggest that it wasn't an everyday occurrence, and they were frightened!

Yet, as we read on, Jesus clearly realises what is going on, he knows ... he knows us better than we know ourselves and he speaks, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid'. I love that Jesus sandwiches assurance of who he is in the middle of acknowledging how the disciples are feeling. He's right there and he understands but he also needs them to understand just who he is.

The account doesn't end here, it gets so much more interesting.

Peter walked on water too! His response to hearing his Lord's voice is simply if you can do it and you command me to, so can I. 'Come', is Jesus' response and so Peter steps out of the boat and walks towards Jesus.

Can you imagine the scene? Peter who has responded in the moment suddenly realises what is happening and he wavers ... and when he wavers, he begins to sink. As he sinks, he cries out to Jesus asking to be saved, Jesus takes hold of him, and all is well.

Take a moment to ponder on what happened. I wonder in a similar situation would we step out of the boat? It's easy to think that Peter was at fault as he began to sink. Yet, consider the courage it must have taken to step out of that boat, the trust that Peter placed in Jesus that it was going to be alright.

We see Peter, in the middle of a storm, fixing his eyes on Jesus and, in faith, stepping out of the boat, knowing that Jesus is with him. What happens next is that as soon as he takes his eyes off Jesus, he begins to see what is going on around him, the wind, the waves, perhaps he becomes distracted and begins to overthink. Whatever goes on in his head he begins to sink. As fear overtakes him, he cries out 'Lord, save me!' and immediately Jesus catches him. Jesus doesn't wait just in case Peter regains his composure, perhaps recentres his eyes on him and climbs out of the water himself – no he immediately reaches out.

Then, surely the third part of the account is that Jesus calms the storm. When Peter and Jesus reach the boat and get in, the wind ceases. And the reaction of those in the boat is to worship. 'Truly you are the Son of God' is their response.

I think this reminds us that it takes courage to step out of the boat, to move out of our comfort zone, to try something different, to listen to the calling of the Holy Spirit and to respond. But, through this account we are reminded where Jesus is, there is peace. No matter the storm going on around us, if we keep our eyes firmly fixed on Jesus, then together even in the scariest of storms, we can find peace and reassurance as we hear Jesus words, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid'. Now, as never before, we need to fix our eyes on Jesus, take courage and step out of our boat. Because, as we read in Romans 10, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.' But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!'

I pray that we may have the courage to step out of the boat, to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, and to be those with beautiful feet bringing the good news to a world that so desperately needs it!
