READING: Romans 13:8-14

Love for One Another

8 Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. ⁹The commandments, 'You

shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' ¹⁰Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

An Urgent Appeal

11 Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹²the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; ¹³let us live honourably as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. ¹⁴Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

REFLECTION

When we read Paul's letter to the Romans, we encounter both a clear and a systematic demonstration of Christian doctrine. A letter written as Paul was unable to visit Rome himself, but which Biblical scholars suggest was delivered by Phoebe who we encounter in Romans 16:1-2. As an aside, if you enjoy reading. I enjoyed a lovely, fictional book. recently - Phoebe written by Paula Gooder. However, back to Romans, the letter begins by exploring condemnation due to all because of our rebellion against God. However, God, by grace, offers justification, by faith, through Jesus. By our response in recognising, and responding to, justification offered we receive restoration and are offered the opportunity to enter relationship with God.

But, as we read Romans, we learn that justification by faith doesn't stop with salvation; just as any relationship doesn't flourish without work. So, our relationship with God develops as we grow in faith, live our lives, and follow Him. As we reach the verses of today's lectionary in Romans, we are invited to consider one of the practical ways in which this growth is expressed, that is through love. In Matthew we read Jesus' response to the question which is the greatest commandment "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.'

The upside-down, topsy turvy, message of the gospel is one of love. Love is the radical force that, through Jesus' resurrection, is 'unleashed' into the world, Tom Wright describes it as the day of the revolution. I like that terminology because love has the power to radically change, not just individuals but the world and that is the movement that we, through faith, are a part of.

Pauls words echo those of Jesus as he writes 'Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, love is fulfilling of the law'. These words recall the parable of the good neighbour that Jesus shared reminding us that all who we encounter are our neighbours. We, who have encountered Christ, have the power to love and Paul reminds us, as we encounter others, our first commitment to them surely is love. As we read in verse eight, "Owe no man anything but to love one another."

As we read on Paul writes "The hour has come for you to wake up from your slumber, because our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. The night is nearly over; the day is almost here." As Paul wrote to Rome it was to a church that was in its infancy, we live in a society where we lament over the decline in those who attend Church. Perhaps now, as then, it is time to wake up, time to get going, time to look around and actively seek out opportunities to love here in this place.

There has never been a promise that our walk with Jesus is going to be easy or straightforward, but we are promised that we are not alone as we read in Matthew 'remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.' As we walk our path of faith Paul encourages us to put on the armour of light ... if we turn to Ephesians 6, following encouragement to live as children of light Paul goes on to encourage his readers to 'be strong in the Lord, and in his mighty power. To put on the full armour of God ... (to) fasten the belt of truth around your waist and put on the breastplate of righteousness. As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.'

There is so much packed into these verses and there is only time and space to scratch the surface but before I set this passage aside, I'd like to offer encouragement. Love encourages each of us to be the best versions of ourselves we can possibly be and to similarly encourage others to be the best version of themselves that they can be. CS Lewis is quoted saying we can be 'like an ignorant child who wants to go on making mud pies in a slum because he cannot imagine what is meant by the offer of a holiday at the sea. We are far too easily pleased.'

I pray that we may each experience the joy of encountering Jesus afresh daily, clothing ourselves with, and in, Him as we walk the path we are called to; that we may owe only a debt of love to one another and thereby fulfil the greatest commandment to love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, and mind, and to love our neighbour as ourselves and in so doing become the best version of ourselves for Jesus.

And, in the words from The Message 'May, the amazing grace of the Master, Jesus Christ, the extravagant love of God, the intimate friendship of the Holy Spirit, be with us all. In the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen'
