²¹ Then Peter came to him and asked, "Lord, how often should I forgive someone who sins against me? Seven times?"

22 "No, not seven times," Jesus replied, "but seventy times seven! ²³ "Therefore, the Kingdom of Heaven can be compared to a king who decided to bring his accounts up to date with servants who had borrowed money from him. ²⁴ In the process, one of his debtors was brought in who owed him millions of pounds. ²⁵ He couldn't pay, so his master ordered that he be soldalong with his wife, his children, and everything he owned—to pay the debt. ²⁶ "But the man fell down before his master and begged him, 'Please, be patient with me, and I will pay it all.' 27 Then his master was filled with pity for him, and he released him and forgave his debt.

²⁸ "But when the man left the king, he went to a fellow servant who owed him a few thousand pounds. He grabbed him by the throat and demanded instant payment.

²⁹ "His fellow servant fell down before him and begged for a little more time. 'Be patient with me, and I will pay it,' he pleaded. ³⁰ But his creditor wouldn't wait. He had the man arrested and put in prison until the debt could be paid in full.

³¹ "When some of the other servants saw this, they were very upset. They went to the king and told him everything that had happened. ³² Then the king called in the man he had forgiven and said, 'You evil servant! I forgave you that tremendous debt because you pleaded with me. ³³ Shouldn't you have mercy on your fellow servant, just as I had mercy on you?' ³⁴ Then the angry king sent the man to prison to be tortured until he had paid his entire debt. ³⁵ "That's what my heavenly Father will

do to you if you refuse to forgive your brothers and sisters from your heart."

Let us prayerfully consider our own wrongdoings confessing them to God and asking forgiveness.

In quietness now let us reflect on our own attitudes and behaviour. Forgiving God, so often our good intentions and our bad actions do not agree. We know there are many times when we fail to do the good we know we should, instead doing the harm we know we shouldn't. We try to make excuses for ourselves but in our hearts we know that there are none to be made.

And so, we repent of all our sins both of omission and of commission. We ask for your strength as we begin again with the clean sheet you always grant to truly repentant sinners.

We are reassured as we read the words of this next psalm.

In chapter 18 of Matthew's gospel, which has contained the set readings for the last few weeks, there has been much recorded of Jesus' teaching and guidance on relationships within our Christian community.

Today we hear a disciple asking about forgiveness. He is asking how often he should forgive someone who has done him wrong more than once. He seems to be suggesting that 7 times might be more than generous. I believe that the accepted number at the time was 3. Jesus, as usual, comes up with a surprise. Seventy seven or seventy times seven, depending on the translation you read, is perhaps Jesus' way of saying stop counting, just do it.

There is really no comparison between what God has forgiven us, either as individuals or as a society, and the petty irritations or even the crimes which fill us with 'righteous anger' when we try to forgive others.

Once again Jesus illustrates this by telling a story. He is not showing that sin doesn't matter but he also balancing punishment with mercy. It reminds us again that the forgiveness and mercy we receive from God should be passed on and be reflected in our dealings with those who offend us.

The king in this story shows mercy on the one who owes an extremely large sum of money, a sum he probably would never be able to repay. The servants' relief must have been great and, although we don't know, I suspect that the servant must have known real fear and perhaps wondered how he could make himself more secure should a similar situation with a less happy outcome arise in the future.

And so, instead of simply showing gratitude towards the king he decides to protect himself by collecting in what is owed to him and, as we read, showing no mercy.

If you were an observer in this situation, would you share the indignation of those who, seeing what had happened, 'blew the whistle' and told the king? Their feelings were shared by the king who immediately withdrew his merciful action and meted out what we would see as just punishment.

You see sin does matter. It matters how we live in relation to others; rules are there to protect everyone including the most vulnerable. God is merciful when we repent but, as his followers, we follow his example and must show the same mercy.

Today we are reminded, as our last hymn said, 'In blazing light your cross reveals the truth we dimly knew, how small the debts are owed to us, how great our debt to you!' Let us, when irritated by others remember that and practise mercy and forgiveness.
