

'YOU ARE SPECIAL: A story for Everyone' written by Max Lucado and illustrated by Sergio Martinez is a beautiful little book. At the same time I was contacted by a local care home about making gowns for their protection -the phrase about buses all coming along together came to mind.

So, along with other ladies in Bedale and surrounding area, I set to with my machine and lots of NHS blue fabric for scrubs and old bedding to make gowns. The group made almost 3,000 items for the Friarage, Harrogate and York Hospitals. We are having a break at present.

Meanwhile we continue our clapping for the NHS, Carers and Key Workers, maintaining contact with friends and neighbours whilst social distancing and for me, singing the hymns during Sunday Worship and Songs of Praise. Now looking forward to a return to normal life in whatever form that may be.

**THY KINGDOM COME** concluded on Pentecost (Whit Sunday). Yet, we journey on with God in prayer. Praying for our family and friends; praying for our local community and neighbours; praying for our nation and the nations of the world.

#### **#BLACK LIVES MATTER**

I am sure you have seen or heard the horrific news of the murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis, USA, which has filled our screens and newspapers this week. Since this tragic and shocking incident, we have seen so many stand up to speak out against this crime, calling for justice. People have been crying out for the end to racial discrimination, persecution and acts of violence which is persistently happening. There is such a great weight of sadness and despair that surrounds the murder of George Floyd because it is all too common, another news story of another Black man dying at the hands of the police. Let me be clear, that if this were one incident it would be one too many. We are part of a global community, which presently more than ever we are starkly reminded of with the ongoing grief, suffering and struggles of the Pandemic.

I believe ALL LIVES MATTER, and yet this ceases to hold substance when the evidence proves contrary. I believe that what we are witnessing, whether first or second hand, is something which needs everyone to be part of. Engaging in a global culture change that truly starts to see in real terms that All Lives Matter. When I hear stories of racism encountered by so many, I feel sickened, greatly dismayed, and almost lost for words. Some stories have been told by old friends, who have kept details of their racists attacks quiet but feel they cannot keep quiet anymore. I am 'almost' lost for words because I refuse to be part of the problem, I refuse to stay quiet no matter how uncomfortable it makes me feel and struggling for the right words. I refuse not to try, wanting to be part of the healing and instead of being part of the problem.

Racism is something the whole of humanity needs to address and actively work to eradicate. It is a crisis which will not just go away without serious engagement across all areas of society. We are one human race and my faith in God informs me that 'in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith', that God created our inmost being, that God knit us together in our mother's womb. Black lives matter to God just as all lives matter to God. I want to be part of a world which knows these highest values lived out, transformed by the Grace and Love of God.

## Let us continue in prayer and pray for each other -

*Let us pray* for the loved ones of George Floyd, that God would comfort them in their grief. And for the loved ones of others who have died due gross misuse of power by authorities and for whom incidents such as this serve as a painful reminder to their loss.

*Let us pray* for the loved ones of the police officers who committed this crime, having to come to terms with their cruel and devastating actions.

Let us pray for the protests to end because the changes that need to happen, happen.

Let us pray for the healing of relationships between the police and communities. And let us pray for the police officers who serve with love and care, that this approach would be what makes the news.

Let us pray for peace and healing for all those who carry scars and brokenness because of the damaging behaviour of another.

Let us continue to pray for all those whose loved ones have died due to Coronavirus and those whose loved ones have died during this pandemic. That they would all know peace and comfort in their bereavement during this especially difficult time.

Let us continue to pray for the NHS, care workers and key workers for whom this time remains challenging and traumatic. Let us pray for schools, for teachers, staff and children having to navigate a way forward which is demanding on all concerned.
