Bible Reading Mark 10: v17-31

17 As Jesus started on his way, a man ran up to him and fell on his knees before him. "Good teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" 18 "Why do you call me good?" Jesus answered. "No one is good—except God alone. 19 You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder, you shall not commit adultery, you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, you shall not defraud, honor your father and mother." 20 "Teacher," he declared, "all these I have kept since I was a boy." 21 Jesus looked at him and loved him. "One thing you lack," he said. "Go, sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me." 22 At this the man's face fell. He went away sad, because he had great wealth. 23 Jesus looked around and said to his

disciples, "How hard it is for the rich to enter the kingdom of God!" 24 The disciples were amazed at his words. But Jesus said again, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! 25 It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." 26 The disciples were even more amazed, and said to each other, "Who then can be saved?" 27 Jesus looked at them and said, "With man this is impossible, but not with God; all things are possible with God." 28 Then Peter spoke up, "We have left everything to follow you!" 29 "Truly I tell you," Jesus replied, "no one who has left home or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields for me and the gospel 30 will fail to receive a hundred times as much in this present age: homes, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and fields— along with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. 31 But many who are first will be last, and the last first."

Word

A rich young man came to see Jesus.

Jesus looked at him, smiled, and loved him.

Jesus saw a man who thought he was doing good, "I'm following the Commandments, have done so since a boy", he'd said.

And he seemed willing to follow Jesus. He wanted to know what else he could do.

But when Jesus said "Go, sell everything you have and give to the poor, then you will have treasure in heaven"; the man's face fell. He couldn't do that, and Jesus had to sadly watch him walk away.

Jesus tells his disciples "It is easier for a camel to get through the eye of a needle than for the rich to enter heaven".

What a strange saying is that? Who in their right mind would want to push a camel through a needle? Camels aren't aggressive, just a bit anti-social, so I bet one would spit at me if I tried to push it through a very small hole. And if I try another way, and pull a piece of his hair out, and put that through instead, well I've got a bit of the camel through the

hole, but I expect I would still have been spat at for hurting him!

Where does this saying come from? Was it a common one of those days, just as we might say "You can't find a needle in a haystack".

When I was a child, I heard preachers say "there's a gate in the wall, a small gate that you can still enter the city by, when the main ones are closed for the night. Only, if you were a camel merchant with your beasts laden down, you'd have to unpack them first and carry the load in yourself before they could enter. Unfortunately, there is no record of such a gate existing. But in recent years there has been another suggestion, one I'd like to share with you as a modern analogy of what Jesus might have said.

When Mark wrote his Gospel, he was collecting the spoken stories that people told about Jesus and the Greek word for camel is *kamelos* and their word for rope is *kamilos*. The only difference is the "e" or "i" in the middle. Just try saying those two words yourself, they are so similar in sound. And apparently the same is true with the Aramaic word of *gamla*. It can also be camel or rope It is suggested that the words are so alike because rope would have been made from camel hair.

Doesn't it now make more sense if you consider Jesus saying "you can't pass a rope through the eye of the needle."?

But there is a way I could put rope through. I could unravel it into separate strands and pass them through the needles' eye.

Pause, and go and find yourself a piece of string.

Pick it up and hold it. I want you to think of that bit of string being you. You are looking at the strands of your life. You are made up of lots of separate strands. You started out as the single strand that God made, but over your life more strands are added, as people and places and experiences affect who you are. Have a go at unravelling your piece of string, roll it in your fingers to separate the strands.

Just for a short while, think about those strands of your life, the really important things in your life.

You may think of your mother, who loved and nurtured you,

your father who taught you the values of life, a grandparent who shared their vast wisdom, a teacher who inspired you, a friend who brought you to Jesus, the career you followed, an experience that made such an impact on your spiritual journey.

Lord God, as we think about the strands of our lives,

we thank you for giving us the gift of life. We thank you for the people who have been entwined in our days,

for those who cared and care for us, for those who taught us and inspire us, those who led us to know you, Lord.

We thank you for the places we have known, those that made us delight in your creation, those that provided our education and those that guided our spiritual development.

We thank you, Lord, for all those strands that make us into the person you want us to be. But, Lord, we know there are strands wrapped around us, weaved throughout us, choking us, strands that we do not need, that we should remove.

Help us, Lord, to pull out those strands of envy, of greed, of anger, of self-centred thinking.

Forgive us, Lord, when we focus too much on the material things of life, wanting the latest gadget or wasting money on trivial things; when we spend too much time on leisure pursuits, and ignore the needs of people whom we could help.

Dear Lord, remove from our hands the strands of our life that prevent us from

receiving you into our hearts.
Help us to see that it is by your grace
and not through our merit that we follow you.
Then by your love and not through our power
we will come to eternal life in you.
In you, O God, is our giving and our blessing,
in you, O God, is the assurance of forgiveness
and our entry into your kingdom is through an
eye of a needle we can travel through.
Therefore, Holy God, all glory be given to you,
Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.
