A towel, a basin of water, these simple things made extraordinary by the love of God.

Jesus washes the Disciples' feet. Jesus the Son of God washes the Disciples' feet. Wow, it hits home every time, walking humbly with God means living the way Jesus showed us. Jesus tells the disciples, 'For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.' I believe those words of instruction and example set by Jesus stand for us today.

Foot washing of other people's feet is something less common, most do not have servants in households who would carry out this task. Most kick-off our shoes at the door of our homes or remove them out of politeness when being a guest to show consideration to our host. We have socks of various types and colours which come in matching pairs or proudly worn as odd socks. Maybe sock washing could become a thing that Christians offer others. I can just see the sign outside churches and homes alike, 'Bless your cotton socks' free sock washing here.

Perhaps we could liken better cleaning other people's shoes. Maybe we should be found knelt at a footstool like those seen in the old films with the 'well heeled' sat reading their newspapers whilst getting their shoes finely polished. During my time as Padre in the Air Cadets, shoe polishing was always an interesting time. It often showed the caring and generous spirits of the cadets who had mastered the technique of getting the perfect polished shoes. They would offer help to those who were still struggling.

I have only washed people's feet a few times during a Maundy Thursday service. It is not always easy to find willing victims; sorry I mean volunteers, to be on show getting their feet washed by the Minister. It's something I personally would find awkward, so have always understood people hesitating to volunteer their feet.

Last year I met the Archbishop Of Canterbury, The Most Revd Justin Welby when he visited Dogsthorpe in Peterborough. I did have a short conversation with him, mainly about our previous meeting when he was the Bishop of Durham. During his short address he spoke about the difference between the Maundy Thursday service

held in Canterbury Cathedral and his experience washing the feet of the homeless in London.

In the Cathedral were the most well pedicured and freshly washed feet he'd ever seen. Belonging to those who had been specially chosen to take part in the service. Hence not actually needing washing at all

He compared that Cathedral experience to going out and offering foot washing to the homeless in London. This was real, the feet really needing washing and those being offered foot washing puzzled in their responses. Why...? And perhaps the language used wasn't what you would usually hear spoken in a Cathedral, but it was honest.

Simon Peter struggled with Jesus taking the role of the servant kneeling before him saying 'You will never wash my feet.' However, when 'Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.' Simon Peter responds wanting more washing saying my hands and my head as well.

What follows is a word of common sense and knowledge. If you've had a bath then you don't need to wash again, your already entirely clean, but your feet are exposed to the dirty roads and streets. But Jesus speaks of more than that of our feet needing washing. It is the washing of our souls, our very being. Jesus knew who was to betray him, who wasn't clean. Jesus knew whose feet having just been washed would carry the betrayer in leading those who would arrest him. It is by the blood of Jesus shed on the cross that we receive forgiveness for our sins, for the blemishes of our souls.

Jesus entered Jerusalem triumphantly as King, and now we are met again by Jesus taking the role of a servant. Taking a towel and a basin of water, kneeling to wash feet. Jesus our servant King says, be my servants, live out servanthood as my disciples. To conclude, let us consider this, are we prepared to share with Jesus, to have our sins washed away, to become servants and to love each other as Jesus has loved us? Will we take up the towel and basin of water?

Using candles

You might want to introduce the use of candles during your act of worship. These can be extinguished one at a time following each part of the prayers of intercession.

Below are some words from The Methodist Worship for 'A SERVICE OF LIGHT AND DARKNESS'

*God is light, in whom there is no darkness at all.

Jesus Christ is the light of the world.

And this is the judgement, that the light has come into the world, and we loved darkness rather than light.

Holding silence

There is a tradition within the Church of holding silence at the close of a Maundy Thursday service, going out in silence. At the close of your time of worship at home, think about how you will hold silence and how you will go into the rest of your evening with God.

Maybe you will want to sit awhile in God's presence being still. Or maybe you will decide to walk into your garden in silence before returning indoors. This creates a sense of a different space and gives movement to your worship.

A Lovefeast

Some might be wanting to join with others over the phone or web for a Lovefeast. There is guidance for a service available on The Methodist Church website. A simple approach to a Lovefeast works well. Possibly sharing a fruit bread/cake and a cup of water. Recognising the present circumstance of limited food availability, I feel a simple meal would work just as well. For me a Lovefeast is time for sharing testimony and recalling stories of Jesus. This stripped back approach of remembering Jesus with others over a meal is deeply meaningful. Below is a recipe for a Lovefeast cake which was placed on The Methodist Church website. If you are fortunate to have the ingredients, you might want to give it go. (Why not share a photo on social media)

A traditional Love Feast Cake Recipe

Adapted from the Middlesmoor Lovefeast Bread used in the Yorkshire Dales at the time of John Wesley

- 1lb (400g) plain flour
 1oz (25g) baking powder
 5oz (125g) butter
 8oz (200g) sugar
 2oz (50g) mixed peel
 4oz (100g) sultanas
 2 eggs
 About half a pint (280ml) of milk
- Mix the flour and baking powder together, rub in the butter, then add the sugar, sultanas and peel. Beat the eggs together with a little milk and add to the dry ingredients. Add the rest of the milk to make a soft consistency. Pour the mixture into two loaf tins or a large cake tin.

Cook at 180°C (350°F) or gas mark 4 for at least 45 minutes for the loaf tins, or 1 hour for the large cake tin.

Alternative Maundy Thursday Worship – A meditation and footbath

Sometimes we need to simply be in God's presence. We might feel that we just need to stop, sit and be held by God, having a time relaxing in His presence.

The following meditation is offered to help you sit and talk with Jesus. With it being Maundy Thursday and connecting in with Jesus washing the disciple's feet, you might want to have a footbath to engage another one of our senses with God. Playing gentle music helps to create the right atmosphere. Enjoy sitting with Jesus.

Sitting with Jesus Meditation

As you sit peacefully, focus on your breathing. Notice how you inhale and then exhale. Breathe in slowly through your nose. Feel your stomach fill with air and then breathe the air out slowly through your mouth.

As your breathing becomes relaxed, find a place in your mind that's a place of peace and tranquillity. Visualise a place that you know well. Put yourself in that place right now and allow yourself to be comfortable there. What do you see? What do you smell? What sounds can you hear? Can you feel anything? Wherever you are right now just appreciate what is around you. Take in a 360-degree panoramic view and feel settled.

As you feel settled in that space you notice that Jesus is sitting right next to you.

Just for a moment, simply gaze upon his face. Look into His eyes and know of His love. I'm not sure how long it is since you've spent time gazing at Jesus.

For some of you, spending time with Jesus might be a regular thing, for others you may hardly recognise him. Whatever your experience is - in this moment it doesn't matter. Jesus doesn't care if He is a total stranger to you- He is just so pleased that you're spending time with him now. Just spend some moments getting to know him and understanding who he is.

In the minds of each of you there is a situation that you need to talk to Jesus about. It may be that you need guidance and direction in an area of your life. Ask Jesus for that now.

It may be that you feel there is something that is preventing you from truly connecting with Jesus or something that you just need to offload onto Him. Deal with that now.

It may be that you need to bring your own needs to Him. Do that now.

It may be that you need to bring the needs of someone else to Him. Offer that to Him.

And now that we have said what we need to say -Let's listen to what Jesus has to say in response. As you sit and listen to Him, just soak in every word.

What is He saying about you? What is he saying about the situations you've brought before Him? Which direction is he pointing you in?

Ask Him to show you what He wants from you in this coming week. Stay how long you need, give thanks.
