

To all God's beloved in the Ripon and Lower Dales Circuit, who are called to be saints. Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

I write to you as I take up the calling of serving as Superintendent Minister. Firstly, greetings. I recognise that to many I remain just a name, with being eight months into Circuit Ministry here, still have local churches I look forward to meeting and sharing in worship together.

We know that Ministry impacts the whole family and Damian has always been gracious and generous in providing hospitality. Not least, thank you Damian for your sense of humour and commitment to proclaiming the gospel in a very grounded and accessible manner.

Following the guidance from The Connexion, Pat is on Sabbatical although not as planned and having this Sabbatical in isolation. I do pray that this will provide a different space for Pat to receive from God in a new way having given so much out in serving God. So please do join with me in offering prayers for Pat and Damian.

The correspondence I have received during this time from around the circuit has been positive, all things considered. I have heard of how people have more time in conversation with family and friends over the phone or video calling. Worship as a lifestyle goes beyond those dedicated times of gathering for Acts of worship to each moment of one's life. Comments about learning lots during this pandemic have been widespread and often accompanied by saying 'the world is going to look different when we re-emerge.' For me, it is about asking the God question. How has God been teaching us and how is God shaping us?

When we re-emerge, the difference will come from how we have met with God during this time. To frame it another way, we will be different having been with God during this time. God makes all the difference and recalling Jesus' words 'I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener' found in the Gospel according to John, let us remain in the love of Christ now and always.
