Matthew 2 v 1 – 12 (KJV)

Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judaea in the days of Herod the king, behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem, saying, 'Where is he that is born King of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the east and are come to worship him.'

When Herod the king had heard these things, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. And when he had gathered all the chief priests and scribes of the people together, he demanded of them where Christ should be born. And they said unto him 'In Bethlehem of Judaea: for thus it is written by the prophet, And thou Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, art not the least among the princes of Judah: for out of thee shall come a Governor, that shall rule my people Israel.'

Then Herod, when he had privily called the wise men, enquired of them diligently what time the star appeared. And he sent them to Bethlehem, and said 'Go and search diligently for the young child; and when ye have found him, bring me word again, that I may come and worship him also.'

When they had heard the king, they departed; and lo, the star, which they saw in the east, went before them, till it came and stood over where the young child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced with exceeding great joy. And when they were come into the house, they saw the young child with Mary his mother, and fell down and worshipped him: and when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto him gifts; gold and frankincense and myrrh.

Reflection: A Methodist Way of Life

We are at the turn of the year. We have closed the door on 2020 yet the year of pandemic has consequences that will stay with us for some considerable time, certainly well beyond 2021. Therefore, as we commence this new year, we need a new sense of well-being and hope for today and the future. To that end' the journey of the Magi may well provide some pointers.

Worship

To begin, the Magi from the East were stargazers, astronomers seeking signs in the

stars. They were invited by King Herod to "search diligently for the newborn child." During this past year, scientists have been searching diligently for a vaccine to combat the pandemic and thankfully a number of vaccines are coming on stream, thus enabling the possibility of a new norm to be found later in the year.

The wise men, we find, were curious enough to leave all behind and make a journey of exploration seeking to discover that unknown truth about life which lay beyond their wealth and prosperity. They were ultimately to find the Christ-child, who unlocks the true meaning to life. They returned home another way, changed by their pilgrimage and encounter with Jesus. Likewise, during Advent and Christmastide, we have had opportunities to make a similar journey, bringing change and transition to the purpose of our lives.

Learning and Caring

On the Andrew Marr show, after the USA Presidential election, senator Chris Coons made some telling remarks about the need to *resource, re-engage and re-imagine*. These three Rs invite us all to ask ourselves what individual and church *resources* we currently have which may well be different from twelve months ago. Secondly how are we to *re-engage* with those resources, now that we are all a year older than we were then. Thirdly, and this may be the most demanding of the three questions, how can we *re-imagine* using those resources with which we re-engage differently to best effect in the new year? None of these 3Rs in the present climate should prove easy and can challenge us to learn new tricks in tackling old ways and habits. Thus, we may well be aided by Dorothy and the story of the Wizard of Oz.

Service and Evangelism

In the Wizard of Oz, Dorothy is the Christ figure who meets a scarecrow, a tin man and a lion on the journey. One is made of straw and doesn't think he has a brain, another doesn't think he has a heart and is prone to tears whilst the final character has lost his roar and his courage. To some extent, the pandemic means we can identify with these three characters. For example, we may be afraid of the pandemic, we may have lost heart, or perhaps we have lost our sense of

character. As pilgrims we need to press on, not to Oz, but to God, aided and abetted by other pilgrims on the way. Of course, the song *Somewhere over the Rainbow* inspires hope, especially as we recall the rainbow is God's covenant sign to Noah and all creation.

Conclusion

At the turn of this new year, the covenant God made known in Jesus Christ calls us all to resource, re-engage and re-imagine ourselves and the church, as together we travel in hope. Together may we think anew, find new heart and instill a fresh sense of courage which in turn builds character. As the wise men returned home another way, may we, having celebrated Christmas and Epiphany, be bold to embrace a Methodist Way of Life as God's rainbow people in the world. **Amen.**
