Reading Matthew 25:31-46

'Lord, when was it that we saw you...'

Reflection

The imagery within this parable is of the sheep and the goats. It is more common to see a flock of sheep in the dales than a mixed flock of sheep and goats in the field. However, for first century hearers of Jesus' words, they would have been more than familiar with this image of a shepherd separating the sheep and the goats.

Of course, this is not anything to do with sheep and goats, but rather about people finding themselves in the world together and drawing distinction on how we respond to Christ through how we meet others. Further, the image shows how both are together and how both will be judged.

I find this parable fascinating in the way it highlights the responses given to the judgement. 'Lord, when was it that we saw you...hungry, thirsty, a stranger, naked, sick or in prison?' Both question when it was that they responded or failed to respond. Of course, the answer is the same too, 'just as you did it to one of the least of these' or did not in the case of the goats.

I wonder, have you ever considered how by serving another is as if you did it for God. Not only is amazing to be able to serve God in such ways, but it also reminds us of how valued and loved those described in the parable as one of the least actually are. Value is found in earthly things, but in a heavenly heart. Valued by and found in God.

In Hebrews, chapter 13, verse 2 it reads 'Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.' Recall to how Cleopas and fellow disciple on their walk to Emmaus met and entertained Jesus after they urged Jesus to stay with them, not knowing of until their eyes were opened at the breaking of bread. These two examples remind us of how welcoming the stranger can lead to divine encounters, just imagine that.

So, lets get back to the parable of the sheep and the goats. Both seemingly unknowingly have either responded or failed to respond to the those in need. If I were sharing this parable within a school context, I would have to nuance the reading with the 'stranger danger' and whilst it is possible to see things through different lenses such as recognising the complications. It is equally possible to see the immense number of those in need.

Over recent months the news headlines included reports of the Manchester United and England footballer Marcus Rashford calling for the government to provide free lunches for children, especially so because of the increased deprivation being experienced due to coronavirus.

Another report was of another retired footballer and now tv presenter Gary Lineker welcoming a refugee into his home, providing help and a safety. Perhaps both these acts of compassion and kindness made the news because of the celebrity status of Marcus and Gary. Personally, I welcome more of these news stories and what a difference those free school lunches will make to the children that enjoy them.

These and similar good news stories should be celebrated. I give thanks to God whenever I see such acts because it means that some of those in need are receiving some help. As mentioned before, it is all too easy to see the immense number of those in need. And for such great need it can only be met by an even greater God.

It is to God who we turn, and it is by the grace of God that we receive salvation through Jesus Christ. This parable doesn't negate from this truth and if we look to the greatest commandments in paraphrase to love God with our all and to love our neighbour, then this parable prompts the question, am I loving God with my all and am I loving my neighbour?

In the second chapter of James, we are reminded about what alive faith looks like, 'For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead. I would encourage reading the whole chapter, if not the whole book of James. Furthermore, I would encourage everyone to be like sheep in a sheep and goats' kind of way. To live out the love of God, in a loving, faith alive way. **Amen.**
