The material we are using was prepared by Jill Baker for the Summer Edition of the Magnet Magazine, entitled "Worship for pilgrims" and is divided into seven sections, and we are either led on a physical or virtual journey with our Lord.

The invitation

The invitation to become a pilgrim is an ancient call. In different ways God summoned Abram and Sarai, Moses and Miriam, Simon and Andrew, Martha and Mary. Today God summons us, "Come and be a pilgrim!"

What do I need to be a pilgrim? You need to feel a little restless, wondering if there

is more to life, more to God, than you have found so far.

StF 462 Come with me, come wander

The preparation - let's get ready...

How do I prepare for this pilgrimage? What should I pack in my rucksack?

It's more about what you need to leave behind... carry too much, you will become tired. Pack a little courage and a sense of adventure, don't take yourself too seriously.

We pray- Journeying God, with excitement and a little trepidation I hear your voice calling me today to set off on a pilgrimage, to travel deeper into you. Strengthen my weaknesses and renew my resolve to stay close to you, whatever the twists and turns of the journey. Open my eyes and ears to be attentive to your guiding Spirit. Amen.

The departure

Ready to set off? Pause, look over your shoulder - what are you leaving behind to become a pilgrim?

Everything I've ever known! The security and comfort of what is familiar!

I'm leaving behind the old me. I need to break away from things which have held me back...

Keep a few moments of silence to reflect on leaving things behind, whether that is welcome or difficult.

The company

Am I the only one on this journey?

It may feel as if you are. Sometimes a pilgrim walks alone, quietly reflecting, communing with God, paying attention to what is around. Even then you are surrounded by the company of saints, those in every age who have responded to the call to be a pilgrim. Sometimes you may want to lean on them.

Sometimes you will be glad of others around you. You will need them to offer you a hand, a smile, an encouraging word - and sometimes you will need to do the same for them. The pilgrim band is one of the greatest joys of this journey.

StF 611 Brother, sister, let me serve you verses 1-2 here,

Lord we thank you for those in past generations who have heard your voice and responded in faith, offering to you their service undaunted by the cost. We thank you for those we have known whose discipleship has been an inspiration to us, all those who offer an example of what it means to live and walk in faith. Lord, help us to trust in you with all our heart and not lean on our own

understanding but in all our ways submit to you. Make our paths straight and guide us down the right path. We know in this life there will be times of suffering and hardship but help us take heart because we know you have overcome the world. Give us the courage to face the challenges that come. Help us to persevere and not give up. Give us the strength to face these storms. Pour out your peace over us and keep us in your perfect peace. We want to always look to you when trials come. Instead of blaming you or looking elsewhere for the answers we want to look to you and trust completely in you. This is hard to do but we ask you to help us surrender everything to you...our emotions, our thoughts, our actions, and control. Thank you, Lord Jesus, for your help through this extremely difficult time. We know you've got this, and you've got us! We praise you and we put all of our faith and trust in you. The path

I'm worried about getting lost.

What an amazing view!

My feet are getting blistered.

I've never felt so fit!

I'm hungry.

I feel closer to God than I ever have before.

Pilgrimage is wonderful, but also demanding. Like life, it is a mixture of joy

and sorrow, laughter and tears, blessing and pain.

Sometimes we don't know which path to choose, we may have to sit down and wait, or we may choose the wrong way and need to retrace our steps, hurting our pride as well as our feet.

Sometimes the terrain holds dangers and difficulties which we hoped never to face in the journey. We need times of rest, healing and refreshment. All pilgrims do.

Reading: Luke 9:51-62

Reflection

Luke tells us that Jesus "set his face to go to Jerusalem". How much did he know of what awaited him there?

How tempted was he to turn the other way or to hide in Bethany with good friends to care for him?

Perhaps it was his own inner turmoil which led him to speak challenging words to those would-be followers, "No one who puts a hand to the plough and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God."

The centre

Does this pilgrimage have a destination in mind?

That's a good question - some do, some don't. But every pilgrimage has within it a sacred centre - an encounter with God.

You can't predict when that will be; you have to be attentive, open to the whisper

of God's Spirit or the crashing of God's waves of love and grace.

It's the glimpse of glory which makes all the blisters seem unimportant!

Pause: Light a candle, play some special music...give thanks to the God who is present with you, whether at this moment you sense that or not.

The return

How do you feel now? Are you glad you came?

I can't put into words how I feel... I long for the comfort of home, yet I don't want this to end...

Everything on this earth ends, but everything is renewed too. The end of every journey is the beginning of the next. Like the voice of prayer, the call to be a pilgrim is never silent.
