Reading: Luke 4 v 1 - 13

Reflection

Seeing real people, men, women and children, fleeing from Ukraine with only the clothes they are wearing plus the little they can carry, is a haunting scene. We never envisaged seeing this situation in Europe in our lifetime. Driven by their predicament, they travel with fear but also hope, as they seek safety.

We are now in the season of Lent, when we recall Jesus in the wilderness, being tempted to misuse his power as Son of God. We are invited today to re-examine our priorities and engage in a physical and spiritual springclean so that we can travel onward without excessive baggage to weigh us down and hold us back.

So, as we travel through Lent, let us pray for the people of Ukraine and the world-wide threat that this conflict poses. Let us take Lent as a God-given opportunity to cherish the people we know and love as, together as pilgrims, we travel in hope and hopefulness. **Amen.**

We now reflect further on the Gospel reading as we hear from Mary, mother of Jesus.

Mary, Mother of Jesus

He looked awful, absolutely drained. And it's hardly surprising, is it? 40 days out in the wilderness – that's hell enough for anyone, but without food – I ask you? He was lucky to be alive! Barely was, mind you, when he came staggering back into Nazareth. A complete wreck, he was, just about done in!

'Why did you do it?', I asked him. 'What got into you?' and all he could say was that he had to, that everything depended on it.

He was never the same afterwards. I used to joke the sun had got to him. But it wasn't the sun, of course, it was much more than that. He wrestled out there with himself, with the world, with all the forces of evil, and in some way I don't quite understand, he won. It was a costly time, there is no doubt about that, a disturbing, frightening time – I could see the pain in his eyes afterwards. He'd had to struggle, make painful choices, confront life at its darkest. And though, I never told him, I admired him for that. It takes courage to face reality, to ask yourself what it's really all about.

Mind you, I always knew he had it in him. He'd always been such a good boy, right from the start; too good some said. Well, perhaps he was in a way – look where it got him after all.

Yet it wasn't as easy as many thought. He was still tempted, all too often, and there were times when it would have been so easy for him to give in, so easy to compromise, to bend just the once. I know that's what he faced out there in the wilderness though he never told me what exactly happened. But he came back stronger, I have to admit it, more certain, more determined. Not that he didn't have his moments afterwards - don't make that mistake. It wasn't all plain sailing from then on. He had to battle like you and I, harder if anything, for the path he took was so much more demanding. Oh no, he endured temptation all right, as real as any we might face. The difference is he overcame it, right to the end. That's what made him so special. That's why people follow him, even now.

Let us pray

Gracious God, we thank you for the time spent by Jesus in the wilderness, tested there to the limit but refusing to be deceived. Help us to learn from his example; to be awake to temptation and ready to withstand it; to make time to hear your voice and reflect upon your word. Help us to follow you and to do your will, regardless of the cost. So may we grow closer to you and stronger in our faith,
