<sup>19</sup> He went a little farther on and saw two other brothers, James and John, the sons of Zebedee. They were in their boat getting their nets ready. <sup>20</sup> As soon as Jesus saw them, he called them; they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men and went with Jesus.

### Reflection

I still keep a paper diary, one of those Filofax ones, (though other varieties are available) and early every January I take out the pages for the year just ended and bring forward the pages for the new year. I take the opportunity to look back through the pages of the previous year to reflect on things done, and often being reminded what I hadn't done. As I scanned through the pages of 2020 my over-riding thought was to want to take it back to W H Smith's to see if I could have my money back as I'd hardly used it! After years of busy-ness it was quite a salutary experience to look through the empty pages.

It had even greater effect on me when compared with the previous year, 2019, the year the re-development project at Bedale and District Methodist Church came to fruition giving plenty of extra activity on top of the regular commitments to caring for the grandchildren and the pleasures of visits and holidays. I know I'm not alone in feeling a sense of under achievement in 2020 and the questions that arise from that feeling. One that I keep returning to is how I respond to the will of God in these strange times. For the first time in my life the lack of time has not been the predominant issue, quite the opposite in fact.

Responding to the call of God is the theme of our Bible reading today. There is a sense of urgency in St. Mark's Gospel. Unlike Matthew and Luke, there is no time for the nativity stories; fourteen verses into the first chapter we read the right time had come for Jesus to embark on his ministry. Today's newspaper front pages show photos of the newly elected President of the USA getting down to work by repealing some of the laws and decisions made by his predecessor. To use the modern parlance, he is hitting the ground running. That was exactly what

Jesus did, time was pressing and he needed to be getting on with things, and not surprisingly his first task was to recruit a team of helpers to support him in this task.

Every time I read this passage I am amazed at the recruitment techniques Jesus used. Not for him the lengthy adverts in the press, the associated job specifications and the rounds of interviews. It was for him a case of “You're the person I'm looking for, consider yourself hired!” And even more remarkable is the response he received; “That's great, I'll start immediately!” The first disciples took on that sense of urgency. There was not a moment to lose and with fond farewells to loved ones they were on their way with no thoughts of conditions of service and rates of pay. What they were being offered was priceless, an opportunity to help in the establishment of the Kingdom of God on earth.

I don't know about you, but the last twelve months have brought a sense of inertia to all aspects of life and we are constantly reminded of the need for patience. This is understandable, but at the same time there is a sense of urgency building up to use this time more effectively to bring the good news of the love of God to a world so divided and empty. Just as when Jesus started his ministry, the time has again come to remind those around us of the importance of God's truth. The challenge of course is how we do this at a time when all the normal means of communication have been largely taken away for us. If you have the answer to this, do please share it with me and everyone else. For me, one thing is clear and that is when the new normal begins to emerge there will be ample of opportunities for each one of us to show the love of God and there won't be a minute to spare. Like those first disciples, may we respond without hesitation.
